
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IMPORTANT NEWS
ABOUT THE NEW
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During the first fifteen days of August, Orthodox Christians throughout the world enter a season of fasting and prayer in honor of the Falling Asleep of the Theotokos. The icon above is a mosaic found over the South Door of Hagia Sophia (the Cathedral of the Holy Wisdom) in Constantinople and is one of the most significant historic icons in Orthodoxy. On the left and the right, the Emperors Justinian and Constantine the Great are offering to the Mother of God a model of the Great Church and of the Imperial City, for which she was known to be the Protectress. It is a reminder of the long-standing tradition of honoring the Theotokos as the Birth-giver of God and as our constant intercessor before the Lord for our salvation in her Resurrected Son, Jesus Christ.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,



The contrast could not be more stark. The picture below contains two monuments: the first is a traditional Ten Commandments monument found on the State Capitol grounds in Denver, Colorado, like the one found across the street from Holy Trinity Church on the lawn of the National Aviary and in other parks and buildings throughout the country; the second is the "Freethought Alternative" sponsored by the Freedom from Religion Foundation, a group whose view of the foundations of

this country states: "Our Constitution was very purposefully written to be a godless document, whose only references to religion are exclusionary."

In the life dictated by such a world view, there are no commandments because there is no God (or. as they would put it, no god). What is left, then, is their "alternative" statement of truths: "There are no gods, no devils, no angels, no heaven or hell. There is only our natural world. Religion is but myth and superstition that hardens hearts and enslaves minds."



Take your choice: Which rules do YOU want to live by? Which kind of country will we leave our children?

We live in a country in which people are supposed to be free to practice their religion or no religion at all, so that fact that a certain segment of the population chooses not to believe is not the issue; we may reach out to them with the revealed truth of God in a spirit of love as we should, but they are free to reject it. But the same freedom does not seem to apply to practicing Christians any longer. In fact, the gauntlet or oppression around Christianity has closed another step tighter with the latest very confusing ruling of the Supreme Court regarding the Ten Commandments.

Make no mistake, this will neither save nor condemn us; our faith and salvation are not, thank God, dependent on the government's approval or endorsement. But in battles which increasing bear witness that this country, founded on religious freedom, no longer wants to even officially acknowledge the existence of God, those who oppose not only "The Faith" but faith at all will have succeeded in transforming this country into an officially atheist state ... while we sat back and watched. It's not the first time it's happened. I wonder if they saw it coming ... in pre-Bolshevik Russia? ... in pre-Communist Cuba? ... in pre-occupied Greece? ...

Well, in the words of Alfred E. Neuman, "What me, worry?"



Transfiguration Vesperal LiturgyAug. 5

This year we will celebrate the Great Feast of the Transfiguration of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ with a Vesperal Liturgy on Friday, August 5 at 6:00 p.m. Please keep in mind that those preparing for Holy Communion should, in additional to their regular preparation, abstain from food and drink from noon.

Orthros and Divine Liturgy for the feast of the Transfiguration will also be held at the Monastery of the Holy Transfiguration in Ellwood City, which celebrates its nameday on this feast.

In keeping with the wonderful tradition of the Blessing of the First Fruits, it is customary to bring a tray of washed grapes or fruit on that day, which will be blessed at the end of the service and distributed to those in attendance.


Saint George Chapel at Holy Trinity Cemetery Construction Proceeds at Dramatic Pace: Projected Completion in August See Photos Below!

Since the Ground-breaking and Laying of the Foundation Service on April 23, work has progressed rapidly at Holy Trinity Cemetery on the Saint George Chapel. Photos from the work site have been posted on the Holy Trinity web site on a regular basis (www.HolyTrinityPgh.org/chapel). The progression of photos below and on the next page follows the construction from the first shovel to this week's final exterior brick work. Though additional work remains outside, such as sidewalks and landscaping, the majority of the progress will be seen on the interior from this point through the projected completion of the project in August.

Although the building itself is being completed as presented to the community without fundraising and will be fully paid when opened, many people have been asking about contributing to the chapel project. Once the building is complete and bids have been received from iconographers and woodworkers, information will be made available to the public concerning the future interior plans and costs for various interior items, which will be part of a long-term, comprehensive plan to properly complete this sacred work in an appropriate Orthodox Christian Byzantine style.

LIFT UP YOUR HEARTS

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ,

"Lift up your hearts." This is a familiar exhortation in the Divine Liturgy when we join in an act of sheer praise to God. Beginning "Holy, Holy, Holy," we are encouraged to be joyful and to praise God.

This praise to God is proper not only during the Liturgy but at other times. Sometimes we come upon moments of discouragement. We have the "blues". As Christians people we can lift up our hearts. They may be sad, but we can still lift them up unto the Lord.

We may be happy and things may be going well for us. We can lift up our hearts with joy to the Lord, and happiness will be all the better.

Perhaps we are perplexed and do not know what decision to make. It will help to lift the whole problem up to the Lord.

Than as a constant attitude we do well to keep our hearts lifted up to Him. He merits our heartfelt praise. When we recognize that by right, God has the first place in our lives, we see our lives in clearer perspective.

"Lift up your hearts"—Whatever your mood or situation.

"The spirit of man is the candle of the Lord."

(Proverbs 20:27)

A Candle may be small, but no darkness can put out the light of even the smallest one. Neither can the influence of our lives be put out. The spirit in our hearts can be such as to signify to Christ that we want Him to come into our hearts. Now is a good time to let Him know there is room in our hearts for Him. Let Him make our Spirit truly the candle of the Lord.

- 7. To have Christ dwelling in us and acting through us.
- 8. To get strength and courage for the hard fight.
- 9. To see every good works of ours flourish and bring abundant fruit.
- 10. To be knit together in an unbroken union with Christ and in Christ our Lord.

Beloved, God continually gives us blessings day by day. What do we give Him in return? Remember that God calls us to use the talents He has given us in Christlike love and service.

Marks Of A Good Christian

He moves his Church membership when he moves to a new place He pays his debts to God and man, regularly and cheerfully. He regularly attends his Church's services. 

Vision Committee Update: New Church Property Update

A comprehensive update on the important work of the Vision Committee, which has been working for the past five years to fulfill the direction of the Holy Trinity General Assembly to identify potential new locations for Holy Trinity Church.

Where We Have Been: 2000 to the Present

Identifying a suitable parcel of land for the future of Holy Trinity has been an exhaustive process over more than four years.

On November 5, 2000 the General Assembly voted

overwhelmingly (two to one) to accept the Vision Committee recommendation presented earlier that year regarding the future of Holy Trinity. That historic vote set in motion a series of activities in conjunction with the commitment to build a new community. The motion also required the identification and location of a new site.

The Vision Committee spent an immense amount of time eval-

uating properties throughout the northern suburbs. Numerous real estate firms were utilized, and individual agents were mobilized in an effort to ensure that all available options were evaluated. *More than 100 potential sites were considered* but none met the requirements of access to I-279 North and usable acreage to meet the current and future needs of our community.





Over time, potential sites were dismissed either because the price was well above our target of \$500,000 or the parcel did not meet our requirements. In late 2002, for example, the committee identified a site later named the "Field of Dreams," due to its expansive, flat layout. While the community was supportive of this location and enthusiastically participated in a tour of the property, we were eventually not able to acquire the surrounding parcels and would have been locked into a site with no expansion or growth opportunities, something the Vision Committee was not willing to recommend to the community. This option was abandoned, but the experience highlights the difficulty the committee faced in this endeavor.

Where We Are Today: Property Found!

Nearly three years, many properties, numerous meetings and many prayers later, the Vision Committee believes its exhaustive search on behalf of the Holy Trinity Community has finally concluded with the right property.


After preliminary consultation with the Parish Council, a preliminary agreement of sale was signed on the

morning of the Feast Day of the Holy Spirit, which is the nameday of our parish. The property comprises nearly 31 acres of land on Reis Run Rd. near the Camp Horne Rd. exit of I-279 North in Franklin Park Borough (a Pittsburgh address). The agreement sets in motion a timetable and action plan for the comprehensive evaluation and determination of the suitability of this property for our new community. It is the view of the Vision Committee that the Reis Run Rd. property will be ideal for the Holy Trinity community. The acquisition price is below our original target and there are enough usable acres for both our current needs and those of future generations.

How Much: Land and Money?

Although we as a community are looking at the land as a single property, there are actually two proposed agreements of sale for two side-by-side pieces of land, which we would merge together as one deed. One is for approximately 17 acres of land currently owned by the Tree of Life Cemetery; the other 14 acres is adjacent and owned by an out of town physician. Together, these parcels provide nearly 800 feet of frontage along Reis Run Rd. about 1800 feet of depth. There will be enough land for our current requirements and those of future generations at Holy Trinity. The combined purchase price is \$455,000, or an average of under \$15,000 per acre.

Where Is It?

The property is easily accessed from a number of directions:

- From Pittsburgh heading up I-279 North, it is less than 5 minutes off the Camp Horne Rd. exit. Make a right at the bottom of the ramp; take the first left onto Mt. Nebo Rd.; follow Mt. Nebo to the first traffic light; turn right onto Arndt Rd.; at the top of the hill, turn right onto Reis Run Rd.. The property is on the left, traveling 1/2 mi. south on Reis Run Rd., adjacent to the Tree of Life Memorial Park.
- From the upper North Hills area, take Rt. 19 South to Ingomar Rd./Yellow Belt. Turn right on to West Ingomar Rd. for 3.7 miles. Rd. becomes Reis Run Rd. Follow 1/2 mile to the property on the left.
- From McKnight Rd., turn on Babcock Blvd./Green Belt at Northway Mall. Follow to top of hill at Route 19/Perry Highway. Turn right, then immediately turn left to follow the Green Belt down to next light. After light, Rd. becomes Reis Run Rd.. Property is 1.4 miles ahead on the right.
- From I-79, take the Mt. Nebo Rd. exit and follow Mt. Nebo Rd. about 1-1/2 miles to Arndt Rd.. Turn left at light on Arndt Rd.; follow to top of hill; turn right onto Reis Run Rd.. Property is 1/2 mi. on left.

Vision Committee Update: New Church Property Update

An update on the progress of the Vision Committee's work to find a new property as directed by the Parish General Assembly

The Current Status of the Agreement

Offer letters were submitted to the respective property owners more than one year ago and negotiations since then have focused on ensuring that the specifics of the agreements met the terms and conditions of the Vision Committee and the Holy Trinity community. One important aspect of the terms in each agreement is that the due diligence and ultimate purchase must be done simultaneously: the approval of each property is contingent upon the approval of the other at the same time.

Why has a sales agreement already been signed? This allows the soil testing, zoning questions and other necessary issues to be answered prior to bringing it to the General Assembly for approval.

The Process From Here: Testing, Meetings, Vote

The process now will involve a thorough and complete analysis and review, including both Parish Council consideration by late July and Special General Assembly consideration by mid August. In addition, a series of environmental studies are required to determine if the property is appropriate for our purposes. All this must be timed in accordance with the purchase agreements timelines.

The purchase agreements for nearly 31 acres of land along Reis Run Rd. include a series of contingencies designed to protect Holy Trinity and ensure the properties will meet our requirements. Specifically, there are eight contingencies that must be met before the properties will be purchased.

THE EIGHT STEPS NEEDED TO PURCHASE

- Parish Council approval
- 2. General Assembly approval
- 3. Metropolis approval
- 4. Access to utilities
- 5. Sewage permit
- 6. Environmental examinations
- 7. Franklin Park Borough Zoning and Planning Commission approvals
- B. Acquisition of the adjacent property

In the event any one of the contingencies are not met in a timely manner, Holy Trinity has the right to terminate the agreements without any financial obligation. The entire due diligence process is expected to take 180 days or six months.

Watch for Information Coming Soon!

An important provision in the purchase agreements for Reis Run Rd. properties is approval of the Holy Trinity General Assembly. A Special General Assembly is expected to set for sometime in mid August. In advance of that meeting, a series of after-Liturgy coffee discussions will be scheduled. The community will be invited to learn more about the properties and the due diligence process. Aerial maps and other photographs will be available along with discussions about utilities, environmental tests, and zoning. Tours will also be arranged. Please watch for information. Everyone's input is needed and all questions will be answered.

Mid-Year Stewardship Update

Dear Stewards of Holy Trinity Church:

In keeping with our pledge to keep you informed, we are pleased to provide an update on this year's stewardship drive, some of the highlights and the committee's next steps.

This Year's Progress

The figures here represent the pledged amounts on commitment cards as of June 5, 2005. This is an important point because many times our pledges tend to be conservative and several actual contributions eventually exceed pledges. As we move closer to the end of the year, we will keep you informed on the progress of actual contributions vs. pledges as well.

The numbers thus far are very encouraging. As we have been reporting to you through the posters around the church, we now have 220 pledges totaling \$134,000 for an average pledge of \$609—the highest ever for our church. We remain very hopeful that actual donations by year's end will reach our goal of \$175,000.

The chart below shows the distribution of our pledges along the various dollar amounts and the number of pledges in each range. A few points of interest:

- 1. A positive trend is that we are beginning to approach the bell curve we desire for a more balanced and fair stewardship program. The curve was much more "left-heavy" in earlier years, meaning too many members were leaving the majority of the financial burden to too few.
- 2. Several lower-pledge members (less that \$300, for example) have either reached their total pledge already or are making rapid progress towards it. Many will probably exceed their pledges.

- 3. Eleven pledges were for zero dollars. However, only two thus far have actually given \$0. The remaining nine have been making contributions. These types of pledges are highly discouraged.
- 4. We've had a record number of "over \$1,000" pledges and very nice increases from the top pledgers—including the first-ever \$10,000 pledge!

What we are working on now:

- 1. We have a record of the parishioners who haven't pledged this year. We also have a list of people who haven't pledged in the past three years. These two groups will receive letters inviting them to join our growing active membership. (So, if you haven't completed your pledge card yet, save the church the stamp and pick one up at the Pangari.)
- 2. Your semi-annual Stewardship Statement will be sent to you by the end of July. This will give us all a chance to view our account progress and correct any errors to-date.

The progress being made towards our annual pledge becomes increasingly important during the summer months when church income is at its lowest level and expenses are high. Holy Trinity doesn't take a vacation, so please remember to mail in a contribution before you leave for yours.

Thank you for your continued offerings and commitment to the Church. Have an enjoyable and fulfilling summer.

Our Worship - Part 3

Part of a special series of educational features designed to provide "continuing education" to our parishioners. Taken from the publication, "Our Worship," which examines and explains the main elements of worship in the Orthodox Christian Church.

THE EUCHARISTIC ANAPHORA

The central prayer of the Liturgy is the Anaphora or Prayer of Oblation. It is introduced by a brief dialog between the clergy and the people; Then the priest begins the prayer:

- · Acknowledging how right it is to give thanks to the Lord for His gifts to us of life and eternal life;
- Thanking God for accepting this Liturgy from us, though He has the praise of the angels, singing: "Holy, holy, holy Lord of Sabaoth! Heaven and earth are filled with Your glory. Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!"

THE VERY BODY AND BLOOD OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST

We believe that our gifts of bread and wine become the actual Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. That which we receive in the Eucharist is not just a "symbol" of His Body and Blood, nor do we partake of it simply as a "memorial meal."

Through the ages, attempts have been made to explain the changing of our gifts into the Body and Blood of Christ through a variety of philosophical arguments. Eastern Christians accept this change through faith.

- In the Gospels Jesus Christ tells us that the bread and wine are indeed His Body and Blood. This is obvious in His words: "This is my Body...This is my Blood." Jesus did not say, "This symbolizes my Body" or "This stands for my Blood."
- It is the Holy Spirit who brings about the change. We believe that the "Holy Spirit works in strange ways" and that "the ways of God are not the ways of humankind." It is not possible to explain divine, infinite things in human, finite terms.
- Our Faith is the source of our belief. That which has just been explained is reasonable and, for those who place their faith, hope and trust in Christ, there is no reason to doubt the very presence of Christ's Body and Blood.

Being firmly rooted in our Faith in Christ, there is no need for human philosophies as a means of explaining that which, in fact, is beyond human understanding. The priest then recounts all that Our Lord has done for us in His plan of salvation. He concludes by relating the events surrounding the last or mystical supper on the eve of Christ's death by restating the Words of Institution which Jesus spoke as He instituted the Eucharist: "Take, eat, This is my Body... Drink of this, all of you! This is my Blood..."

Finally, remembering all that He has done for us, He raises the Holy Gifts and says, "We offer You Your own of what is Yours, in all and for the sake of all." We join in Christ's gift of Himself to His eternal Father.

THE EPICLESIS

The priest implores the Holy Spirit to descend upon these Gifts and to change them into the very Body and Blood of Jesus Christ so that they may be for us "for the cleansing of the soul, for the remission of sins, for the fellowship of Your Holy Spirit, for intimate confidence in You, and not for judgment or condemnation."

THE COMMEMORATIONS

After the Epiclesis several prayers are recited during which we pray for believers of all ages. The Virgin Theotokos is commemorated, as are the saints, the living and the departed. The Anaphora ends with our solemn "Amen," joining our faith and prayer to that of the priests at the Holy Table.

Thoughts on the Existence of God

Secular magazines often like to toy with the subjects of religion and faith. Many are not worth the time it takes to read them. Every now and then, however, someone hits on some points worth pondering. The copyrighted article below is from the June 20, 2005, issue of Forbes magazine. The author is an eminent British historian and author. Although his conclusion completely misses the Incarnation of the Word of God. Jesus Christ, as the defining moment in human history, his arguments against those who deny the basic existence of God to task are of value. Hope you enjoy this particular author's secular look into the divine mystery. Add his points to your discussion toolkit! +FJT

Of all the fundamentalist groups at large in the world today, the Darwinians seem to me the most objectionable. They are just as strident and closed to argument as Christian or Muslim fundamentalists, but unlike those two groups the Darwinians enjoy intellectual respectability.

Darwinians and their allies dominate the scientific establishments of the West. They rule the campus. Their militant brand of atheism makes them natural allies of the philosophical atheists who control most college philosophy faculties. They dominate the leading scientific magazines and prevent their critics and opponents from getting a hearing, and they secure the best slots on TV. Yet the Darwinian brand of evolution is becoming increasingly vulnerable as the progress of science reveals its weaknesses. One day, perhaps soon, it will collapse in ruins.

Evolution's Weak Underpinnings

Few people today doubt the concept of evolution as such. What seems mistaken is Charles Darwin's theory of natural selection, whereby species evolve by infinitesimally small stages. Neither Darwin nor any of his followers—nor his noisy champions today—was a historian. None of them thought of time historically or made their calculations chronologically. Had they done so, they'd have seen that natural selection works much too slowly to fit into the time line allowed by the ages of the universe and our own planet. The process must somehow have been accelerated in jumps or by catastrophes or outside intervention.

There are five other weaknesses the Darwinians cannot explain away either. The best summary of these can be found in Richard J. Bird's Chaos and Life (Columbia University Press, 2003)....

No Place for God?

If the theory of natural selection is incorrect, then the Darwinians' view that there is no need or place for God in the universe is itself weakened, though not necessarily over-thrown. Physics, however, increasingly tends to suggest that there is a God role, particularly with regard to the origin of the universe. We now know this occurred about 13.7 billion years ago, and our knowledge of what happened immediately afterward is becoming increasingly detailed, down to the last microsecond.

Few now doubt there was a Big Bang. We know when it occurred and what followed. But we are just as far as ever from understanding why it happened or what—or who—caused it. Indeed, all calculations about the Big Bang are based on the assumption that nothing preceded it. It took place in an infinite vacuum. There was no process of ignition, or traces of it would have been left. Hence, this fundamental happening in history seems to conflict with all the laws of physics and our

notions of how the universe operates. It was an event without a cause.

It also produced something out of nothing. More: It produced everything out of nothing. The expansion of the universe has proceeded ever since, and all the creative processes involved in it—including Earth and homo sapiens—were written into the laws laid down in that first tremendous explosion. We do not have to believe in an entirely deterministic universe to see that the first microsecond of history foreshadowed everything that has followed over the last 13-plus billion years.

Nowhere Else to Turn

If the laws of physics cannot explain how and why this event occurred, we must invoke metaphysics. And that means some kind of divine force. I've been rereading what Sir Isaac Newton wrote about God in the second edition of his Principia (1713). Newton saw God not as a perfect being—or any kind of being at all—but as a power, what he termed a "dominion." "We reverence and adore Him on account of His dominion," he wrote. This power was exercised "in a manner not at all human ... in a manner utterly unknown to us." Newton knew God only through His works. "He is utterly void of all body and bodily figure, and can therefore neither be seen, nor heard, nor touched." Our knowledge of Him is limited "by His most wise and excellent contrivances of things."

"...and the Word Was God"

This notion of God as an impersonal power or force, wholly outside the laws of physics, fits with the role assigned him as author of the Big Bang. And since that primal event there has been no need of further intervention by God in the affairs of the universe.

Or has there? I've also been reading Guy Deutscher's The Unfolding of Language (Metropolitan Books, 2005) and reflecting on the nature of words. Speech is the greatest of man's inventions and the mother of all others. Yet, in truth, nobody invented it. Its emergence and evolution proceeded in ways that are still almost a total mystery. It is as close to a miracle as anything associated with human beings.

Both the Hebrews and the Greeks, in different ways, believed there was something divine about "the word," or logos. The Greeks thought the word was the abstract principle of reason exhibited by an orderly universe. The Jews thought it the image of God, the beginning and origin of all things. It is possible, then, that the giving of the word to humanity was the second intervention of the metaphysical force or dominion in the process of history. That, I think, is the conclusion I have come to in these difficult matters. What will be the third, I wonder?

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FASTING ... AGAIN?!



Well, we are not that far from Lent, just past the Fast of the Holy Apostles and now approaching the first fifteen days of August, the strict fast period in preparation for the Falling Asleep of the Theotokos. If we see all these periods of spiritual "blessings" as "burdens," our image of fasting can quickly degenerate into the picture to the left: "No, no, no!"

This could not be further from the truth and real purpose of Christian fasting. In fact, the fathers tell us that fasting, when taking out of its spiritual context and purpose, can quickly descend into a worldly and evil practice.

So, this August, take a look at the following "Thoughts to Consider" from a newly-published book, "Five Steps to Spiritual Growth," by Peter M. Kallelis. Perhaps they will be of help in transforming our experience from one of worldly and physical dejection into one of spiritual direction!

- 1: Fasting must be done for the glory of God and as an expression of honoring Christ, our eyes singly fixed on him. Our intention should be to worship and glorify our Heavenly Father for all the blessings that he bestows upon us daily.
- 2: Fasting and prayer should be intricately bound together. True fasting begins by being in charge of our thoughts, casting off evil, bridling the tongue, cutting off anger, and controlling lust, evil talking, lies, and cursing. The cessation of these is the beginning of a true fast.
- 3: A brief period of fast can be a joyful experience. <u>It is not so much an abstinence from food as it is a feasting on the word of God</u>. Food does not sustain us. It is God who sustains us in all things-when we are connected with him in prayer, as we obey and apply his teachings, and as we walk the path of Christ with honesty, humility, and love.
