Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God. (Ephesians 5.2)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

According to the Greeting Card Association, over a billion Valentine's Day cards will be mailed this year. Imagine the tons of chocolate, acres of roses and carats of jewels that will also be used in America and throughout the world

to say, "I love you." What are we as Christians, children of the God of love (1 John 4.16) to make of all this? As with many other aspects of living an Orthodox Christian life in the world today, we could simply

Christian life in the world today, we could simply dismiss it as not being part of our tradition (warning to husbands everywhere: this is NOT recommended as an act of piety!) Or, perhaps, we can look a bit deeper into the true roots of love and find that February 14 is not the only day of this month set aside for a special offering of love. And just maybe we can even deepen our understanding of what we are called to be as Christians, husbands, wives, men, women and a community called Holy Trinity Church.

Take a look at the heart-shaped frame to the right. Sure, it evokes the holiday spirit of the month, but not just the obvious one! Yes, it is a Valentine

heart-shaped frame, but there is something quite scriptural about what's inside. Upon closer examination, it is a hand making an offering of love. No flowers, no chocolates, no diamonds; much great than those! Flip to the front cover of this issue and you will see it is the hand of the Theotokos as she makes an offering of love the depth of which even she could not fathom at the time (Luke 2.19): the offering of her Son, her First-Born, the Only-Begotten Son of God, as the firstfruit of her womb to be dedicated to the Lord. It is the hand of a mother trusting her most precious child back physically into the hands of the Elder Symeon, but in reality back into the care of the Father Whose mission would carry Him to the Cross, and through Whose victory over death we would be carried into Paradise.

That is, indeed, a deeper picture of love than we usually think of in the frilly days of February. But instead of dismissing the 14th entirely, why not understand that it can only truly have depth and meaning when is basks in the light of the 2nd, that is, the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. Jesus speaks about what it takes to love Him six times in the New Testament, all in the Gospel of St. John (8.42, 14.15, 14.24, 21.15, 21.16 and 21.17). Each time, loving Him is intimately connected with obeying Him, doing His will and serving Him. On all three counts, the holy offering signified by the lifting of the hand of the Panagia pictured above must be counted as an ultimate act of love and doing His will.

As we move forward in our lives and the life of this community, it is good to continue to be challenged by those words of Christ. "If you love me…" God will provide the calling for each of us to make the holy offerings appropriate to our lives, because they are from Him to begin with. All whom we serve, we lift up to God like that holy icon of offering. Everyone we meet provides an opportunity, one way or another, to say ... or better yet, to show ... "I love you!"

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, they came together, and one of them, a teacher of the Law, tried to trap Him with a question. "Teacher," he asked, "Which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus answered, "'You must love the Lord your God

with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and the most important commandment. The second most important commandment is like it: 'You must love your neighbor as yourself.' The whole Law of Moses and the teachings of the prophets depend on these two commandments."

Question: Was The Law Of Love Not Given Before The Time Of The New Testament?

Yes; it was already most urgently insisted upon in the Old Testament, as becomes evident from the following text:

"Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart, and with thy whole soul, and with thy whole strength; and the words which I commanded thee this day, shall be in thy heart: and thou shalt tell them to thy children, and thou shalt meditate upon them sitting in thy house and walking on thy journey, sleeping and rising. And thou shalt bind them as a sign on thy hand, and they shall be and shall move between thy eyes. And thou shalt write them in the entry and on the doors of thy house." (Deuteronomy 6:5, etc.)

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, let us reflect earnestly on this, and examine whether we also keep this law of the Lord with the same care.

Question: Does He That Loves God Above All Things, And His Neighbor As Himself, Fulfill All That Is Commanded By The Scripture?

He does; for he that truly loves God will not fall into superstitions; he will not murmur against God's will, nor dishonor God's name by cursing or swearing, or breaking the sabbath ("The Lord's Day"). But he will do all that he knows to be pleasing to God, whom he loves. He praises and thanks God for all His blessings; he places all his hope and confidence in Him; in adversities he will give himself entirely up to God's will; he will also keep the laws of the Church because he knows they are an expression of God's will (Matt. 6).

He that loves his neighbor as himself will not injure the person or life of a fellow man; he will not steal from him; he will hold sacred the honor, good name and purity of everyone; will not give false witness against others ,will not judge them rashly. But he will pray for his neighbor; will forgive him, if he has offended, visit him in sickness; if he hungers and thirst he will give him food and drink; he wishes and does for him everything good that he himself would wish to be done for him in similar circumstances.



Motives Why We Should Love Our Neighbor.

1) We should be moved to love our neighbor not only by the consideration that we are brothers and sisters according to the flesh, descending from Adam, our common father, but by the consciousness that we all are brothers according to grace and Christian faith, having been adopted by one Father, God Himself, to become heirs of our heavenly inheritance; and that we all are purchased by the blood of Christ, by whose sacred body and blood we are also fed. Thus we are "all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28), and should be "careful to keep the unity of spirit by the bond of peace" (Ephesians 4:3).

2) Moreover, the example of Jesus Christ should move us. He loved us when we were His enemies; He suffered death

for us, and prayed for those that crucified Him. Also, the example of Saint Stephen ,who prayed for his executioners.

3) To this love we should be urged on by the fact that we cannot be saved without it, and that "Whoever loves his neighbor will never do him wrong. To love, then, is to obey the whole Law" (Romans 13:10).

Beloved, on the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee (February 17 this year), the Triodion begins.

May we all of us have a blessed and fruitful Pre-Lenten season.

My Precious Children,

This month, instead of writing about books, I, Spero, am writing about my big Ohio adventure. This



should be a pretty special letter, because its filled with lots of excitement and Valentine's wishes! Besides, I am sure that you don't get very many letters from mice in Ohio. Why was I in Ohio? Well, I just couldn't miss the first GOYA basketball tournament of the year! Let me tell you about it.

First of all I was so happy to be able to make the trip. Fortunately, Father John forgot to pack his slippers and when he got up in the middle of the night and opened his suitcase to put them inside, I slipped into the bag while his back was turned. I knew if I asked to go, he would tell me it was best for me to stay home. He has tried to tell me that it is not easy for mice to travel, since people are sometimes afraid of mice and he must protect me, but I really wanted to be with my precious basketball teams. I used the same trick to stow myself away in Father John's luggage to Project Mexico last year. Maybe I

should have listened about that trip, since I did not understand a single word of what the mice there said, and, worse, the food they gave me had so much hot spice in it that I had an upset tummy! Besides that, Mexico was very nice. It was warm and I was able to slip into Father's tool box and go out and see them build a house to help other precious children of God!

On this trip, just like the one to Mexico, I was able to breathe easily in the suitcase because there are spaces around the zipper that admit plenty of air for a mouse, but I couldn't see a thing. There is no customs officer going into Ohio, unlike Mexico, and so no one opened the suitcase on the trip. (For Mexico, I just hid in a pair of folded socks. When they checked Father's suitcase, the customs officer missed me completely!) I think we went to Ohio in a car because I could hear the door slam and the motor run, but that was all I could tell. I just said my prayers until we got there.

Well, we got there and I made my escape. I found some cheese cracker crumbs under the dresser, enough for a snack until I could round up a proper supper. Everyone left for the tournament without me, and I had no idea where the basketball games were, so I slipped under the door and went exploring. 



As result of previous successful mission experiences with the Navajo Indians in New Mexico and with the blessing of His Eminence Metropolitan Maximos at the 2008 Pittsburgh Clergy-Laity Conference, we are pleased to announce the formation of "YOCAMA" (Young Orthodox Christian American Mission Adventures) a non-profit organization. YOCAMA is also pleased to announce the scheduling of two mission trip experiences for our youth. Two trips are planned for 2008:

June 14-21, 2008: Thoreau, New Mexico to work with the Highland Navajo Outreach, a nonprofit organization, to provide help for the Navajo people via home improvement projects, vacation bible school, medical services and food delivery.



July 25–August 2, 2008: Browning, Montana to work with the Blackfeet Community hospital and housing authority to provide help for the Blackfeet people via home improvement projects, lunches and activities for local children, medical services and food delivery.



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Money and Possessions: The Bible has a lot to say!

As you can see from the list on this page, we are again off to a great start for our 2008 Stewardship Commitment. It is encouraging to see that overall, the pledges received to date exceed the record levels we saw last year (a detailed report on 2007 will be provided in the next *Herald*).

When discussing with parishioners about our continued growth in being good Christian Stewards, one issue that often arises is our uneasiness about using "money" and "church" in the same sentence. I searched for what others might have said about this issue — by the way, if you Google "bible + money + possessions", you'll get 194,000 hits! The following are few excerpts from various sources:

"Scholars point out that Jesus discusses money more than heaven and hell combined, or that Jesus talked more about money than anyone else in the Bible. Financial teacher Howard Dayton and Pastor Rick Warren for example, mention that 1/6 of the New Testament, 2350 verses in the Bible, and 16 of 38 parables all address the topic of money and possessions."

"Such comments remind us how much God has to say about money; they also show us how critical it is for us to pay attention to what God's word says about our possessions and pocketbooks. Why are we so afraid to talk about it? Why do we quickly get into a huff when we talk about money and giving at church?"

Possessions and money are earthly blessings, and where can they be more appropriately used than in our church ministries? The risk, as the Bible reminds us lies "when your affections are set on your earthly possessions instead of your heavenly possessions." Matthew 6:19-21; Colossians 3:1-4.

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We Are All Missionaries!

This issue of the Herald contains an exciting invitation to join the 2008 Holy Trinity Mission Trip to Montana to help our suffering Native American brethren. Not able to participate? Not to worry. You can <u>still</u> be a missionary! Right here! One of the most important missionary calling of the Church happens right here every day, in the local parish. Live your faith. Set your light on the hill. The mission is yours!

If the parish, as the eucharistic community, is alive, then its impact on its environment is immense. True communicants and active church members cannot help but show the enormous change and ... the benefit they have obtained. Therefore, our best missionary effort is this tangible, visible manifestation in the lives of the parish members.

Today, many feel the absence of warmth, true fellowship, deep, unselfish concern, and human solidarity in our families and society in general. In view of such emotional poverty, the parish is in an excellent position to help. In the prevailing impersonal, anonymous, inhuman environment, with its exploitation, violence, criminality, and moral decline, the parish can stand as a counter balance, calling people to a new lifestyle, with Christ as the source and author of such a reorientation.

We must stop thinking of the parish as a static, narrow, pietistic gathering. The parish is the embodiment of the worldwide redeeming call of God, who wants everyone to be saved, and who for this end established the Church on earth. ... Having such parishioners, of course, presupposes a long period of training and a feeling of close cooperation between the clergy and the laity in ministering and proclaiming the truth. Each bears a part of responsibility for evangelizing. Participating in parish liturgical life commits one for further action, both within the inner circle and outside its bounds to those who live on the periphery.
