Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

On October 3, 1789, George Washington proclaimed the first official Thanksgiving Day in the United States. Its was to be "a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God." On October 3, 1862, Abraham Lincoln officially established Thanksgiving Day as an annual holiday, and it has indeed been observed every year since then in November.

Though times may be economically uncertain and politically challenging, this annual call to give thanks brings us back as a nation to the very basic recognition that "the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed" (Washington's Proclamation) allows us the freedom to seek refuge and hope we find in God no matter how waves of temporal seas toss us.





Orthodox Studies Forum November 5, 19

Now in its third year, the Orthodox Studies Forum is designed for adults who are interested in learning more about the Orthodox Christian Faith. It is led by Father Radu Bordeianu and is for both those who have been Orthodox all their lives and want to learn more as well as those seeking to embrace Orthodoxy from another background and grow further in their faith.



This year's forum will investigate one of the most important biblical themes: the People of God. Beginning with Old Testament, the participants will explore selected texts that reflect the story of creation, the fall into sin, the election of Israel, the different covenants that God has established with his people (especially the Decalogue), and the need for a new covenant as described by the prophets. The study of the New Testament will continue with the establishment of the new covenant in Jesus the Christ, as reflected in the Gospel according to Matthew (which will be read in its entirety), fragments from Luke, John, and Saint Paul's Epistles. It will conclude with the study the life of the early Church as reflected in the Acts of the Apostles and several Epistles.

The group meets on the first and third Wednesday of each month from 7:00-8:30 p.m. at the La Roche College WEST Campus, 9000 Babcock Blvd., Pittsburgh. "In Reverence, Giving Thanks"

"It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord, and to sing praises unto Thy name, O Most High"

(Psalm 92:1 - KJV)

The reverence inspired by thanksgiving is good. In a world of material power it is easy for us to stand amazed at that

power and lose our reverence for God. Our prayers should always include thanksgiving. It is the acknowledgement that we are dependent on God. Even for the simplest things there is no possibility of our being on our own.

God is the Giver of All Gifts

The living God gives us richly all things to enjoy. All that makes life possible and good is a gift. It is not a gift that can be appreciated, much less properly experienced, if we fail to recognize God as the Giver. God gives Himself in His gifts.

The grace of God is supremely manifested in the gift of His Son, Jesus Christ. Our thanksgiving will be compete only if from our hearts we thank God above all for His love, given us in Jesus.

We have good reasons to rejoice and give thanks always, for God has bestowed upon each of us bounteous blessings. We live in a wonder world of rich natural blessings, which we are prone to take for granted. Only when one or another of these blessings is withdrawn for a time do we realize its richness.

As wonderful as His material and natural blessings are, God's spiritual blessings, with the plan of eternal salvation, are infi nitely more wonderful.

Let us give thanks unto the Lord and be grateful for things of a divine origin, mindful of God, their Giver. A grateful person is not one who is zealous in giving thanks but once a year. He has at all times a grateful heart and offers thanks to God daily.

Thanksgiving: A Way of Life, Not a Day in Life

Thanksgiving is a condition of one's life rather than merely a tradition to be observed. Sincere gratitude has a way of revealing itself in our daily lives. By giving thanks we express the gratitude we have and feel for God's blessings.

Στήν έποχή μας, χάρη στήν τεχνική πρόοδο, καί έξ αίτίας όχι μόνον αύτής, σκεπτόμαστε μέ είκόνες, έπικοινωνούμε όχι τόσο πρόσωπο μέ πρόσωπο, άλλά μέ φωνή καί μέ φωνές άπό τά τελειότατα τηλεπικοινωνιακά καί όπτικοακουστικά μέσα πού διαθέτει ό καθένας έχουν έπίσης

διευκολυνθεί στό έπακρον οί έπιλογές μας χάρη κυρίως στήν έπιστήμη πιά τής διαφημίσεως. Ή τηλεόραση, οί μικρο καί μεγαλοαφίσσες μας ύποβάλουν συνέχεια καί συναισθηματικά γιά προτιμήσεις, γιά παράδειγμα, [έλάτε στή δική μας γιορτή] προκαλεί ένα κυρίαρχο άναψυκτικό, χορηγός τών όλυμπιακών άγώνων.

Έτσι καί οί μεγάλοι καί οί Νέοι άγοράζουν. Αραγε αύτό πού θέλουν? Τά καταστήματα πάσης φύσεως πουλούν. Τί τάχά τό λένε [ότι πουλάει] ότι δηλαδή έχει κατανάλωση, καί τί έχει κατανάλωση, ότι είναι τής μόδας, καί τήν μόδα ποιός τήν ύποβάλλει? Μά είναι άπλό. [όποιος διαλέγει πρίν άπό μάς γιά μάς].

Άρα κάποιοι μάς έπιβάλλονται μέ τά δικά τους κριτήρια καί τά δικά τους γούστα, όπότε τό γνωστό σλόγκαν άποκαλύπτει χωρίς νά τό θέλει τήν κρυμμένη του άλήθεια καί δέν ύποκρίνεται διά τήν έξυπηρέτησή μας.

Κι' άν τό φαινόμενο περιοριζόταν μόνο στά είδη τής καθυμερινής άνάγκης ή τής πολυτελείας—όσο κι' άν κι έδώ κινδυνεύει κανείς νά γίνει έτεροκαθοριζόμενος—ή δέσμευση τού άγοραστού θά λέγαμε ότι δέν είναι τόσο άποφασιστική γιά τήν έλευθερία τής προσωπικότητός του.

Όταν όμως πρόκειται γιά τό ήθος καί τίς ίδέες, έκεί ότι άγαράζουμε, ότι άποδεχόμαστε δηλαδή ώς σωστό, έχει άντίκτυπο στήν πνευματική ύπόσταση τού καθενός μας, στό βαθύτερο είναι μας, αύτό μάς καθορίζει.

Ή έπιβολή όμως μέ αύτόν τόν τρόπο, τρόπου σκέψεως καί συμπεριφοράς, πού άζποβλέπει στό ύλικό κέρδος έκείνων πού τά διαφημίζουν καί τά διαθέτουν γιά άγορά, [έμπόριο ναρκωτικών, ποτών, νυκτερινών κέντρων, πολλών άχρηστων προγραμμάτων] τηλεόρασης καί πολλά άλλα, δέν στέκει νά περνά άπαρατήρητο άπό τόν Νέο άνθρωπο, σέ μιά ήλικία δηλαδή πού δημιουργεί ό καθένας τό προσωπικό του ύφος, τό δικό του ήθος, πού θά τόν συνοδεύσει σ'όλη του τήν ζωή καί γιά πάντα.

Ή ψυχή τού νέου είναι γνωστό ότι δέν άναζητά τό ότι δήποτε άλλά τό ύψηλότερο, τό άνώτερο, τό εύγενέστερο, δέν συμβιβάζεται μέ τήν εύκολη νίκη μέ κάθε είδους ντοπάρισμα. Στόχο του έχει καί θά πρέπει νά έχει τό τίμιο στεφάνι, μακάρι κι άς ματώσουν οί

παλάμες άπό τό σκοινί τού ίστιοπλόου, πού έπιμένει νά κυβερνά τήν ίστιοσανίδα του κόντρα στόν άνεμο μέ άθόλωτο μάτι.

The Purpose of the Orthodox Parish | Orthodox Life

With all the exciting events of the past few weeks (Ground Blessing and First Liturgy on the new church property, 85th Anniversary of the parish), this is an opportune moment for a bit of reflection on what a "parish" is all about. An active, healthy and Christ-centered parish is able to add many opportunities to the life of its parishioners through ministries and programs; even as we look forward to those expanded possibilities, however, this article reminds us that the heart of it all beats with the faith of the saints and works as the hands of God.

he purpose of the Orthodox Church is the perfecting of the saints, the work of ministry, the building up of the Body of Christ—a triple task of the whole Church and, consequently, the task also of every parish.

The Perfecting of the Saints

The first point, the perfecting of the saints, is the moral perfecting of the members of the Church. The salvation of souls in Christ is first and foremost; it must not be relegated to second place.

Salvation in Christ is attained through prayer, through Divine services, the regulations of the Church, deeds of love and beneficence, spiritual struggle. A pastor's main concern is the salvation of those souls entrusted to him. It is likewise the personal concern of each member of the Church. It is accom-

plished within the common body of the Church—not in isolation, not individually, but by way of mutual spiritual support, and thereby overcomes the self-loving thought for one's self alone. A personal, worthy life in Christ is the responsibility of each member before the Church as a whole.

The Work of the Ministry

The second task is the work of ministry—to God and to men. It opens up before each member of the Church and of the parish a broad held of church social activity.

Ministry to God includes

participation in the services—in church reading and singing, in constructing churches, in caring for the beauty and cleanliness of the church. These are just some examples of works, as they say, "for God."

Ministry to men includes all manner of charitable activity for the needy, help for the sick, altruistic efforts on behalf of others (as have been expressed in the sending of spiritual books, food, clothing and medicines to mission projects). In some parishes, this duty of ministering to one's neighbor has brought to life auxiliary parish organizations.

A special and very important task is the religious upbringing of children and youth. This cannot be underestimated, for we are in danger of seeing the younger generations fall away from the Church. ... The responsibility of the parish leadership on the one hand is to influence families in this regard, that they not neglect their duty towards their children, and, on the other hand, to form youth groups, catechetical schools, children's choirs, and to undertake other measures for keep-

ing the younger generation attached to the Church and to ensure that they remain under her influence.

The Building Up of the Body of Christ

The third task, the "building up the body of Christ," (Eph. 4.12) is ministry for the Church as a whole, a task that expresses to the greatest extent the unity of the part with the whole, of the parish with the Church. In our church consciousness, we should never lose sight of the image of the whole Orthodox Church; we must love her, be zealous for her. And so, in fulfilling this third task, we are hardly equal to it.

In practical terms, ministry to the Church as a whole means caring for church centers. It requires, first of all, an awareness of the many ways we at the local level are indebted to these church centers. The Church administration makes sure that the

services are conducted properly; it oversees the printing of service books and takes care that these are supplied to parishes; it safeguards the succession of episcopal and priestly ordination; it looks after the training and preparation of clergy, and provides pastors for church communities. It guards the Church against arbitrariness and against those people who introduce scandal into the Church. It safeguards the external dignity of Orthodoxy as well. It cuts off overt moral temptations, wards off attacks on the faith and the Church, wherever they may come from. It is responsible

come from. It is responsible for both the ideological defense of the Church and for her juridical defense, when this is called for.

The fullness of church life and the many-sided, productive activity of ecclesial, episcopal centers is direct evidence of the well-being of life within the numerous individual Orthodox parishes. Conversely, an episcopal center laboring under difficulties and having a limited range of activity invariably speaks of difficulties occurring on the parish level.

A Many-Sided Task

The task of building up the body of Christ's Church is great and many-sided. On the parish level it means that the parish community not shut itself up in its own narrow sphere, but that it be a beneficial and necessary, conscious part of the whole church body.


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
Hello, my precious children!

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What Priests Do



On November 13, the Orthodox Church celebrates the memory of Saint John Chrysostom, Patriarch of Constantinople, a prolific fourth century preacher and a patron saint and role model of priesthood. In honor of his feast, the passage below offers an insightful portrait of the essence of the priest as a pastor and shepherd: bringing souls to God.

he scope of our art is to provide the soul with wings; to rescue it from the world, and give it to God; to watch over that which is in His image; if it abides, to take it by the hand, if it is in danger; to restore it, if it is ruined; to make Christ dwell in the heart by the Spirit; and, in short, to deify and bestow heavenly bliss upon one who belongs to the heavenly host.

Saint Gregory the Theologian, "The Flight to Pontus" (4th c.)
