Service Locations . . . Holy Trinity Church/St. George Chapel

With the opening of the new Holy Trinity Church, we have a beautiful new home for our large Sunday services and sacraments. We still, however, also have the blessing of the Saint George Chapel for various liturgical needs. Please take note of these general practices and our new worship space options:

- **Sunday Services**: All Sunday services will be held at Holy Trinity Church (HT). Orthros is at 8:15 a.m., followed by Divine Liturgy at 9:30 a.m.
- Weekday Liturgies: Unless otherwise indicated for special dates, all weekday liturgies will be held at Saint George Chapel (SG). Again, Orthros is at 8:15 a.m., followed by Divine Liturgy at 9:30 a.m.
- **Paraclesis Services:** Unless otherwise indicated, all Paraclesis services during August 1-15 as well as our monthly Paraclesis services will be held at Saint George Chapel (SG) at 6:30 p.m.
- **Saturdays of the Souls:** With the special opportunity to commemorate the departed and bless their graves during the services, all Saturdays of the Souls (3 before/ during Lent and one on Pentecost weekend) will continue to be held at Saint George Chapel (SG). As usual, Orthros is at 8:15 a.m., followed by Divine Liturgy at 9:30 a.m. followed by the Memorial Service commemorating all the departed.
- **Funerals:** Depending on the expected size of the funeral, families will have the opportunity to choose holding funerals for their loved ones at either Holy Trinity Church (HT) or Saint George Chapel (SG). The Chapel is able to accommodate approximately 80 people for a funeral and offers the ability to walk to the grave site

directly from the funeral service. The Church accommodates larger crowds but requires transportation to/from the cemetery following the funeral.

- **Baptisms:** With the addition of our beautiful new baptistry, all baptisms will be held at Holy Trinity Church unless otherwise requested at the Chapel. The Holy Trinity baptistry accommodates both infant baptisms as well as full-immersion adult baptisms with a large step-in font. The Holy Trinity Center is also available for receptions following baptisms and can accommodate both small family events and large banquet receptions.
- **Weddings:** Unless otherwise requested at the Chapel, all weddings will be held at Holy Trinity Church, which is fully equipped in every way for bridal party preparation, wedding services and various size receptions.
- **Lent and Holy Week:** Please watch for information and worship life calendars with location information during these special times

Dedication

The Divine Origins of Marriage

The Holy Spirit renews not only our personal life; our life together with our fellowman is also made new. The closest and most intimate form of this fellowship among human beings is Holy Matrimony. From the beginning of the human race, God instituted marriage for the propagation of mankind. Man and woman are endowed in special ways for matrimony. We are made for each other. Husband and wife belong together.

"For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one" (Matt. 19:5). Please also read: Gen. 1:26-27; 2:18-25; Exodus 20:14; Matt. 19:1-9; Eph. 5:21-33; 1 Cor. 6:19-20.

What is the significance of Holy Matrimony?

Beloved, 66 years ago, while taking the entrance exams for the Theological School at the University of Athens, we were asked to write a composition on the significance of the family in the progress of a nation. Next to my classroom, was a student by the name of Demetrios Trakatelis, who happens to now be His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios, prelate of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America.

The founding of a happy marriage cannot take place without the deep affection for each other of both marriage partners. However, purely human love is not a sufficient base for a lifelong union. Unity can only be built upon the rock foundation of loyalty. Christ alone is the guarantee of this loyalty. So true Christian marriage is a wedlock of three: Christ himself is the living center. "For no other foundation can any one lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 3:11).

How shall we prepare for Holy Matrimony?

If marriage is to begin on a sure basis, one should possess certain traits as well as look for certain characteristics in the prospective partner.

- Integrity and sincerity, perfect trust and loyalty, stand at the forefront.
- Individualism must be respected and enjoyed. Differences should not be a source of friction but a means of development as each stimulates the other to new viewpoints, fresh outlooks. The secret of lasting companionship is the art of growth through difference.

- Unselfish love is necessary, the kind of love that gives rather than demands, that frees rather than possesses, that appreciates rather than takes for granted.
- Emotional maturity is essential. The mature person will not expect perfection, but will see the small faults, the momentary disagreement, even the violent quarrel, in light of his deep-lying purpose to make the marriage successful.

"Greater love has not man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." (John 15:13)

Marriage Crises

The happy marriage is not necessarily one in which difficulties never occur, but rather the marriage in which tensions are mutually overcome. The secret of such overcoming is complete openness and transparency before God and each other. Marriage is a decision for life. **The desired solution for marital difficulties is reconciliation, not separation.**

"Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassion, kindness, lowliness, meekness and patience, forbearing one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also much forgive" (Col. 3:12-13).

The Spiritual Life of the Family

GOD-HUSBAND-WIFE-CHILD: Out of the marital relationship of husband and wife issue children. Children are not the property of their parents. They are entrusted blessings. The parents must sometime give account, even over their stewardship of this blessing. Please also read: Gen. 1:28; Psalm 127:3; Exodus 20:12; Mark 10:13-16; Eph. 6:1-4.


What is the duty of the parents?

They are to provide for and train their children. The material well-being and the spiritual well-being of the children are entrusted to them. But only he who constantly allows himself to be trained can train others. The best rearing of children does not take place through words and whippings, but through instruction by living example. From the pattern set by the parents the children learn more than from the best pedagogical formulas. Three duties especially belong to the service of Christian parents:

- Training for group living, which will early teach the child cheerful and obedient cooperation.
- "Training" for faith, which prepares the soil in which some time a personal faith will grow and thrive.
- Hidden training, which continually dedicates the child to Jesus Christ, who alone can lead him in the paths of righteousness. First and last, Christian training involves much prayer and intercession.

"Bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." (Eph. 6:4)



A knock on door will open Holy Trinity Church in McCandless on June 22

June 6, 2013 - The new home of Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church, with a magnificent dome as its centerpiece, is nearly complete on the site of what had been a wooded lot at the corner of Babcock Boulevard and Cumberland Road in McCandless.

The church with its spacious community center is preparing to open June 22 with ceremonies led by Metropolitan Savas, the Greek Orthodox bishop of Pittsburgh, who will

knock on the doors of the new church with a staff to mark the start of the first service.

Congregants will be busy celebrating and praying in their stateof-the-art, \$8 million church in the days following the Saturday ceremonies and then it will be business as usual, said parish council president George Dickos of McCandless.

Construction manager Rich Ross said the dome consists of more than 1,000 pieces of custom-manufactured cold curved metal.

"The more arches there are, the greater the challenge to make them even," he said, noting that the work, which was performed by Gallery Metal Studding and Dry Wall, was recently featured in a trade magazine.

The Rev. John Touloumes, Holy Trinity pastor, said the Greek iconographers who painted the interior of the sanctuary with representations and portrayals of scriptural events were impressed with the smoothness of the dome.

It took seven artists six weeks to go from white walls to completion using the ancient technique of egg tempera.

"About 3,000 eggs were hand-broken to mix with the powdered pigments," he said, noting that the drawings were first sketched freehand and then created from the background to foreground.

"As it ages, egg tempera hardens and is more durable than acrylics."

By combining ancient church elements and technological advances, the church can broadcast weddings over the Internet to relatives in Greece, as well as provide religious services for shut-ins or the elderly.

The new facility also includes a baptismal font that will accommodate all ages.

The public will have an opportunity to tour the new church from 2 to 6 p.m. July 28, with an open house that will include live music and Greek food, prepared in a kitchen that rivals any hotel kitchen, according to church caterer Frank Erdeljac of Arista Catering and Event Planning.

"We have specialty convection ovens, a braising skillet, multiple grills, hi-tech ovens and an extra-large capacity walkin cooler and freezer," he said, adding that a separate kitchen called Pastry Heaven is where Greek pastries will be baked for upcoming festivals and events.

The social hall features a 325-seat banguet hall and largescreen HD projectors to accommodate business and social events.

Mr. Dickos said it is Holy Trinity's intention to serve more

than just its own congregation.

"Our goal all along has been to make this a seven-day-a-week church, and we wanted to build a facility to support that," he said.

Holy Trinity parish called the North Side home for 80 years until it moved in lune 2011 into the former Northway Elementary School, closed by the North Hills School District.

Volunteers are packing and moving church belongings into the new facility.

"I think being in the North Hills is attracting people [to Holy Trinity]," Mr. Dickos

"With said. the move our membership has grown, and we hope this continues."

The annual Greek food festival Aug. 28 to Sept. 1 will be held on the 10-acre site. which is expected to become the cornerstone of McCand-

less Crossing's soon-to-be-constructed town center.

"We're very optimistic that the community reception will be strong," said Mr. Dickos, adding that the building and surrounding landscape was designed to accommodate the church's popular festivals, which feature five days of live music, entertainment and Greek food.

"We plan to make our festivals bigger and better."

Ολη αύτή ή διδαχή τού Πατροκοσμά ποτέ δέν ήταν κουραστική, γιατί στό κήρυγμά του άνάμεσα ίστορούσε μεγάλα θαύματα τής Παναγίας. Κι ήταν πολύς ό λαός πού συνέρρεε. Ask the Elders | The Deeper Meaning of Life (continued)



One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many book have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to blessed by their words.

Question: Geronda, do trials and tribulations become occasions for people to approach God?

he well-disposed can benefit from the trials and tribulations they may encounter in life. But people who don't have a good disposition have a quarrel with God and curse Him.

Elder Paisios

Unfortunately, they don't say, "I

have sinned," but are tormented. The devil has a great deal of authority over people. We have given him many rights over us. Look what modern man has come to! The bad thing is that he himself obstructs divine intervention, because he has no spirit of repentance. If there was repentance, many things would have been corrected. But now we will go through storm after storm. God save us!

We must ask for everyone to be granted a spirit of repentance, and for those who deliberately harm the Church and have no intention of correcting themselves; may God grant them repentance before they are taken from this life.

As far as we can, let us help people to repent, so that we may all receive God's blessings. Repentance and confession, that's what we need today. I constantly advise repentance and confession, so that the devil will lose his rights over us and the external demonic influences will be stopped. People need to be shaken up to understand, to repent.

For example, someone confesses that he has committed adultery. The Spiritual Father conveys Christ's forgiveness and imposes a penance, but goes no further. The Spiritual Father must help this person understand that the sin was not just the adultery itself; it also involved other potential crimes such as the break-up of two families. Unfortunately, some Spiritual Fathers do not venture deeper into these spiritual matters to prick the penitent's conscience.

Question: Are there people who are good, but who don't go to Church often and don't have a sacramental life in the Church?

t is possible once in a while to have someone who doesn't go to Church often, but who has devotion and kindness in his soul, thus making room for God to find a dwelling place there. Such people, reinforced by a sacramental life, would make tremendous progress in the spiritual life. On the other hand, there are other people who go to Church, confess, receive Communion, are observant, and yet God finds no room to dwell in them, because they have no humility, no kindness, and no true and authentic repentance. It is not enough to simply make your confession to the Spiritual Father; you must also truly repent of what you have done. Every prayer should begin with a confession before God. But this should not be a mere sentimental confession, relating our sins and then doing the same things all over again. This is not true awareness of our sinfulness. When we become truly conscious of our sins, this is shown by a certain degree of improvement in our spiritual life.

Question: Geronda, how does repentance help to eradicate evil?

hen we ask for repentance from God for everyone in the world, we must include ourselves among those who have need of repentance and must never say, "Lord, help the people who are sinners." The three Young Men of the Old Testament were born in captivity and yet did not say, "It is not our fault." They actually said, "We are justly suffering for our sins; we deserve to have suffered even more." By including themselves among the sinners and trusting God completely, the three Young Men survived the fiery furnace as a refreshing experience, while the pagan who went near to check things out was consumed by the flames.

If one doesn't work like this, he constantly finds excuses, "The devil made me do it." "It's Adam's fault, it's Eve's fault; it's not my fault." A theologian once told me, "Why should we suffer now because of Eve's disobedience?" "My good man," I told him, "does that bother you or prevent you from being saved?" Why blame poor Adam or the unfortunate Eve? They made one mistake and were in Hell for such a long time, while for us Christ has come and redeemed us all. And He has reassured us of His forgiveness, not only seven times but seventy times seven!' Thousands of times we sin and Christ forgives us, as long as we repent sincerely, and we still dare to say that Adam or Eve is to blame? The devil entered the serpent to deceive man. And yet everyone blames Eve, saying that she brought us down and that we'd have been just fine in Paradise if she hadn't disobeyed. How ungrateful people can be!

Repentance is of great significance. Man doesn't realize that God's decision can be changed by repentance. This is not a small matter for man to have such power. You've done something wrong? God gives you a slap. You say, "I have sinned." He then stops and gives you blessings. In other words, the unruly child comes to his senses and is tormented by his conscience. Then the Father caresses His child with love and comforts it. Because the Israelites had straved from God's commandments, they lived in exile for seventy-five years. Finally, when they had repented, Cyrus the king appeared, who one may dare to say proved himself better than the sons of Israel, who had polluted the sacred traditions of their worship of the true God. God changed Cyrus' mind and made him believe in the God of Heaven. Consequently, he set the Israelites free to return to their homeland and provided money and supplies to rebuild the Temple and the walls of Jerusalem. Cyrus showed such kindness and devotion that not even the Israelites themselves had shown.' ° And all this happened because the people repented and changed their way of life.' You see how much repentance can help in getting rid of evil!
