Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Christ,

Christ is risen!

TRULY HE IS RISEN!

The doors have been hung. The flooring is being laid. The kitchen is being installed. The final touches are being completed in the last month. The building is almost ready. The interim facility which God so mercifully provided for us to rent has been sold by the owner and we have exactly enough time—down to the last day according to our contract—to complete our stay there and move right into our new home. And what a home it is!

But before we become too preoccupied with the physical beauty of the tiles, lights, arches and beautiful colors, let's remind ourselves that what makes it such a secure home is the foundation. I mean this not just architecturally, but spiritually. You see, in some ways, we are entering a brand new home. But in the most important ways, we are standing upon foundations that have been laid by God Himself in His plan of salvation many, many generations ago: "built upon the foundation of the apostles and the prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone," as Saint Paul says above.

No matter how many great plans we have made and excellent features we have built into this facility to host many ministries, fantastic festivals, big celebrations, valuable educational opportunities and more, it all comes down to this: we are simply finding new ways to present, bear witness to and spread the Good News of the Incarnation, sacrifice, death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Only-Begotten Son of God. There is no hiding that core and central mission: it is our very reason for existence. Without it and the love of God that undergirds and empowers it, we are, again in the words of Saint Paul, "a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal" (1 Corinthians 13.1), because we are then simply making busy like every other organization, but empty of God's grace.

So, after all these years, here we are. We know the buildings will be amazing, because many years of excellent insight and forethought have preceded the countless hours sacrificed by our Building Committee, Vision Committee and Parish Councils to make it happen, along with so many sacrificial and meaningful donations. We know people will be overwhelmed by the beauty of the iconography and the landscape of the faith it presents. We know we are as ready for the "Thyranoixia" as we can be, because so many people have worked so hard to prepare for a once-in-a-lifetime weekend.

Are we ready for "the day after?" On that day, and on all the days that follow, we must be ready for the greatest task of the entire project: to answer the question, "Why have you done this?" and "What was it all for?" This a challenge we have already been prepared for by Saint Peter, who warns us, "Always be prepared to make a defense to any one who calls you to account for the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 13.15). If it that moment we shrink back, how can we give anyone else hope?

Maybe the best answer is the ultimate answer of the Church, as proclaimed throughout this Resurrection season. Why have we done it? Because "CHRIST IS RISEN!" That is the Good News the entire world and every person in it has needed to hear from the first steps in garden the morning after He arose to the first steps we will tread as we enter this new House of God. He has risen for us and all those to whom our Church and our lives will bear witness. Let's be ready to share that great news with them!

## **Philoptochos News**

The Ladies Philoptochos Society has started collecting "Coupons for Troops" as an expression of thanks and support for the essential work our armed forces do in keeping us safe. They are asking all who are interested in donating clipped coupons to this worthwhile venture to look for the collection box in the hall. This is a program which enhances the wellbeing of overseas and domestic military families by sending them food, non-food, baby food and pet food manufacturer coupons to make their hard-earned dollars go farther. Ready to help? Here are the guidelines. Coupons must be:

- 1. From manufacturers for individual products (example: soup, pasta or toothpaste).
- 2. General use, not just for individual stores (example Target, K-Mart and other individual store coupons cannot be used).
- 3. Clipped out individually (not by the sheet)
- 4. Packaged in sandwich or quart-size plastic bags.
- 5. Active (up to 3 months remaining) or recently expired no more than 60 days.
- 6. Actual printed coupons (no internet coupons, food stamps or vouchers).
- 7. From any source as long they are original manufacturers' coupons.

# Spero | Mouse Tales: The St. Spyridon Church School Library Update



My precious children,

Christ is risen! Happy Easter! Happy May! And Happy, Happy Mommy's Day!

Hi! It is me, Spero! I just love spring with all of the beautiful colors and flowers. I also love my Mommy, Yiayia's, Thea's, and Nouna. I want them to have a <u>very</u> special day and this year they get to share their special month with Jesus, because we celebrate Pascha on May 5th! I am so..o..o glad because that makes it more special for them and I am glad for these wonderful women that care for me. (Hey, my precious little ones, shh! Don't tell the grown ups! I cannot wait to get my red egg. Do you know what to do with your red egg on Pascha? Meet me at the <u>long</u> family table in the hall for the Anastasi Dinner and I will share that with you!)

The other day while I was lying on the church lawn I looked up in the puffy clouds in the sky and wondered about Jesus' return to earth. I asked myself this question, "Will I be ready for His return?" Yiayia always says that Jesus loves me and that I can trust Him to keep every promise that He makes. However, there is one promise that Jesus made that has not happened yet! The promise is that He will return to earth again one day!

Jesus told His disciples, "When I return every one will see me on the clouds of the sky, I will come with power and glory and will send all of my angels with loud trumpets to gather all of my people from every direction". I can only imagine how awesome it will be to hear the sound of those trumpets and watch the sky open and see Jesus with millions of angels. Yiayia also tells us little ones that know one knows when Jesus is coming back, not even the angels or Jesus himself. Only our Heavenly Father knows this.

Yiayia said that, "it will happen as with the flood of Noah's day, when it is least expected." One of my favorite parables that I hear every year during the Bridegroom service is the Parable of the Ten Virgins, which Jesus told his disciples in Matthew 25. They knew that the Bridegroom would be coming but no one knew when He would arrive. They brought their lamps with them so that they could wait for Him. Yet, only five of them brought extra oil. The Bridegroom was very late and they all became tired and fell asleep. At midnight, a voice cried out here is the Bridegroom come and meet Him. The ten quickly woke up and trimmed the wicks on their lamps. They needed the light on the dark path to follow him. Nevertheless, five discovered that they did not have enough oil. "Please give us some of your oil," they demanded of the others "for our lamps are going to go out." "No," the others replied, "if we give you some of our oil we will not have enough to survive the night." So, the Five Foolish Virgins went to buy more oil and while they were gone, the Bridegroom arrived and everyone went into the house and the door was closed. The Five Foolish Virgins arrived and pounded on the door but the groom would not let them in because they had not been ready.

Yiayia tells us little ones to always be ready for Jesus return. Expect Him at any hour or any day and remember never stop praying and never give up on doing what is right. She says we are ready for Jesus return when we ask for forgiveness everyday and go to the sacrament of confession but most of all putting our trust in him.

Well this is the last issue with me until Church School in September in our NEW Church with our NEW classrooms and our NEW library! I also REALLY look forward to seeing you in church ALL SUMMER! (I'll look for your little feet under the chairs!) Be safe and have fun!

My beloved brothers and sisters in Christ: "Rejoice in the Lord always!"

## Palm Sunday

We observe this day (Palm Sunday) when our Lord Jesus Christ entered into the rebellious city of Jerusalem to die for a sinful humanity. The triumphant entry of our Lord Jesus Christ into Jerusalem can be found in Mark 11:1-11.

This begins the last week on

earth for the Son of God. He was to see His friends forsake and deny Him. The hails would turn to nails. There was a hoax in Hosanna. The cry, "Crown Him!" would become "Crucify Him!" He had lived for this final week. It was His objective from the beginning.

As the faithful ones that day laid their palm branches at Jesus' feet, may we be willing to lay our very selves at his Holy feet?

What do we learn from the above? If someone is with us today, they can also be against us tomorrow. Trust only God.

## Holy Tuesday Evening: The Hymn Of Kassiani

People have asked me to explain the Hymn of Kassiani. Why do more people attend Church services on Tuesday evening? Because the special Hymn of Kassiani is chanted. In the year 830 A.D., Efrosini, the mother of the Emperor Theophilos of Byzantium, invited the most beautiful young ladies of the Byzantine Empire to Constantinople to choose a wife for her son. When they arrived at the palace in the beautiful hall, Efrosini gave her son an apple to give to the one he was attracted to. It was the beautiful Kassiani, But. before he gave her the apple, he wanted to test her to see if her external qualities agreed with her internal spiritual superiorities. He approached her saying, "From the woman, all evil things came into this world from Eve." Kassiani answered the following: "But from the woman came all the good things." She meant the Theotokos (All Holy) from which came the salvation of the world.

Theophilos, because of Kassiani's intelligence, gave the apple instead to the modest and beautiful Theodora. Kassiani instead decided to become a saintly queen of the heavens since she was not chosen as queen of this world. She left the worldly life and built a monastery where she lived the remaining years of her life, spending her time on ecclesiastical hymnology. And it was there she composed hymns.

In the Gospel of Luke (7:36-50), we learn of the story of the sinful woman and her forgiveness by Jesus. She fell at the feet of Jesus and kissed His feet with her profane lips and poured expensive myrrh on His feet as an expression of gratitude to her Savior. It was with great courage that she approached Jesus and asked for the remission of her sins. The sinful woman is giving a great lesson to those who are hesitating with a pessimistic spirit because of their many sins. Instead with nostalgia for the lost paradise of the Garden

of Eden, they advance blindly towards eternal condemnation. Jesus gave the answer to Simon the Pharisee and others who were surprised that Jesus accepted close to Him a sinful woman and said, "Your sins are forgiven."

One of the best hymns of our Church is the "Hymn of Kassiani," as it is called, which is chanted on Holy Tuesday evening. Why did Kassiani write this hymn? Some people think that she wrote it for herself since she failed to become queen of this world and because she took part in the beauty contest and considered this a sin. This is not true. She wrote it for the sinful woman who washed Jesus' feet with the expensive myrrh and her tears, and then used her hair to dry His feet.

Beloved, the repentance and the contrition of the sinful woman's heart gave the inspiration to Kassiani to write one of the most beautiful hymns of our Church. The four Gospel writers mentioned this event of the woman. Read Matthew (26:7-13), Mark (14:3-9), Luke (7:36-50) and John (12:3-8).

Beloved, only Luke mentions about the sinful woman. Matthew and Mark write about "a woman." John mentioned the name of Maria, the sister of Lazarus and thanks Jesus for bringing Lazarus back from the dead. The following is the Hymn of Kassiani:

"The woman who had fallen into many sins recognizes They Godhead, O Lord. She takes upon herself the duty of a myrrh-bearer and makes ready the myrrh of mourning, before Thy entombment. Woe to me! saith she, for my night is an ecstasy of excess, gloomy and moonless, and full of sinful desire. Receive the sources of my tears, O Thou Who dost gather into clouds the water of the sea; in Thine ineffable condescension, deign to bend down Thyself to me and to the lamentations of my heart, O Thou Who didst spread out the Heavens. I will fervently embrace Thy sacred feet, and wipe them again with the tresses of the hair of my head."

At this point, Kassiani heard and saw Theophilos coming to the monastery. She went to hide in her private room. When Theophilos, entered the monastery and found the manuscript on the table, he read it and added a verse before leaving:

"Thy feet at whose sound Eve hid herself for fear when she heard Thee walking in Paradise in the cool of the day."

When Kassiani returned, she read what he wrote and she agreed with it. She then finished the hymn with the following:

"O my Saviour and soul-Saver who can trace out the multitude of my sins, and the abysses of They judgement? Do not disregard me Thy servant, O Thou Whose mercy is boundless."

If you want to know more about the sinful woman and the dialogue between Simon the Pharisee and Jesus, read the Gospel of Luke (7:36-50). Kassiani is also known by the names of Kassia, Kasia, Ikasia and Eikasia. And remember, the

kiss of the feet in the east is an expression of deep respect.

## At the Last Supper: I Give You a New Commandment

Read the Gospel of John 13:34. We cannot imagine a more dramatic setting. Jesus has long foretold his suffering and death; now he is sharing a last meal with his closest friends. His disciples must have realized that this was truly a last supper, the last chance they would have to be with their beloved Lord before his death. Every moment, every word of this occasion must have been precious to them, and they must have passed all too fast.

It is now that Jesus gives his followers a new commandment. And it was truly a new commandment. On every previous occasion, Jesus had taught the law of love according to its traditional formulation of loving your neighbor as yourself. But during the last supper, Jesus commands his followers to love each other as he has loved them.

How did Jesus love his followers? By being their servant. He demonstrates this again by performing the lowly task of washing their feet. And he makes it clear that he is doing this as an example to them.

How did Jesus love his followers? By giving himself up on the Cross for their sake. His new command of love, given on the eve of his death, was a command to follow him to the cross and to imitate him even to the point of death. The Cross is both the measure of God's love for us and the standard by which our love is to be measured. Who crucified Jesus? The Jews or the Romans? The answer is neither. Our sins crucified Jesus. Christ was Crucified; Truly He was Crucified.

## To The Resurrection: He Has Risen, He Is Not Here

"It is the Day of Resurrection. O people, let us be glorious in splendour. Pascha! Pascha of the Lord! For Christ, our God, hath passed us, who sing the triumphal hymn from death unto life and from earth unto Heaven" (Ode 1 of the Katavasia of Pascha).

Palm Sunday begins the most significant week in all history when almost 2,000 years ago Jesus Christ rode triumphantly into Jerusalem. The masses of people were cheering, declaring him King. What a week lay before Him! What events were packed into that week!

Moving into that first Holy Week, we see the institution of the Lord's Supper take its form as Jesus gathered his disciples in that upper room. What a moving scene this is! This little band of men with all their human frailties assembled around this one perfect man who was foretelling his doom.

Reluctantly, they believed him, and even so with little understanding. Here is Peter who denies him, Judas who betrays and even doubting Thomas – all partaking of this last supper on Thursday evening.

Then comes Easter day – the day of the Resurrection. What events crowded into that one week! There has been no other like it in human history. What occurred then changed the

course of mankind. So, from this day, Palm Sunday, with the triumphant entry, has pointed to the Resurrection.

Christ is risen! The darkness was dissolved. The chains of death were crushed. The life came out of the grave. The joy succeeded the mourning.

When the scribes and the Pharisees saw the Lord on the cross dead, all those who believed that everything was over made a mistake. They considered His crucifixion as triumphant victory, but the victory was not theirs. The myrrh-bearing women, who visited first the grave, with surprise and fear, saw the stone removed from the grave, and heard from the angel, "What are you looking for, the living among the dead? He is not here; he is risen!" (Luke 24-5).

Christ is risen! And together with the Lord resurrected the hope of redemption. All the generations needed redemption. And, our Lord, with His sacrifice of His life on the Cross,

offered the ransom in order for the humanity to be saved with His Resurrection, and He proved that He is the only redeemer who is risen the dead souls of men. He is leading them to the new life, the life of the light and the joy.

Christ is risen! With His resurrection of our Lord is offered the sweetest comfort to those who are faithful to the ideals. They struggle for the fulfillment of truth and virtue. And with His resurrection, He abolished the power of death. He enlightened Hades and solved the problem of the mystery of death.

Life after death is not anymore an unknown place. But it becomes a beloved place where the risen Lord has prepared for us rest and blessedness. "Where, O Death, is your victory? Where, O Death,

is your power to hurt? (I Corinthians 15: 55).

My beloved, it is the Resurrection of our Lord...the day of enjoyment and gratitude...the day of resurrection! Oh people, let us be radiant. It is Pascha, the Lord's Passover: for Christ God has carried us over from death to life, from earth to heaven, as we sing a victory hymn.

But this is not enough. We must shine in the light of the Resurrection! Our Lord expects us to present good deeds worthy of the great gift: to be resurrected from the works of sins and to become people of light and people of day. (I Thessalonians 5:5) Only for those close to him, there is the resurrection and happiness. He is our Lord and our God. Let us speak within ourselves, to the graves, to our enemies, friends, to the faithful and unfaithful. CHRIST IS RISEN! Then the echo which comes always from heaven, from the earth, infernal and mostly from our souls will be a most beautiful harmony. TRULY HE IS RISEN!

This is the day which the Lord has made, we will rejoice and be glad in it!" (Psalm 118:24). May we all have a blessed and happy Pascha!

# Ask the Elders | The Deeper Meaning of Life

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many book have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to blessed by their words.

# Question: Why are so many people unhappy with their life?

eople haven't grasped the deeper meaning of life. They don't believe in the other life. This is where the whole torment of life begins. "I've been wronged," someone says, "others are happy, but I'm not happy." They aren't satisfied with what they have. Egoism

enters into their life, and they are tormented. God loves everyone in the world. To each person He gave whatever is of benefit to him, stature, courage, beauty, intelligence and so on, whatever will be helpful, if utilized fully, for his salvation. And yet people are tormented. "Why am I like this, while he is like that?" But you have these qualities and he has other qualities.

A Romanian fool for Christ who lived ascetically on the Holy Mountain said to someone who had such thoughts, "A bull frog saw a buffalo and said, `I, too, want to be a buffalo.' The frog puffed and puffed himself up so much that he finally burst. God made the one a frog and the other a buffalo. The frog tried to be a buffalo and burst!" We must rejoice in the way the Creator has made each one of us.

When a person is helped to believe in God and in the future, eternal life—that is, when he grasps the deeper meaning of life-and repents and changes his way of life, divine consolation comes immediately with the Grace of God, which transforms the person and dispels all his inherited shortcomings. Many people who repented and struggled with philotimo and humility, received Grace and became Saints, whom we now revere with devotion and ask for their intercessions, whereas before they had many passions and inherited weaknesses. Take the Venerable Moses the Ethiopian, for example, who was a most bloodthirsty robber, with an inherited evil tendency. As soon as he believed in God and repented, he disciplined himself in the Christian way of life and all his passions disappeared, allowing the Grace of God to come to him and to make him worthy even of the gift of prophecy.

# Question: Geronda, what precisely is the meaning of this life?

hhat is it? It is to be prepared for our homeland, for Heaven, for Paradise. The most important thing is for man to grasp this most profound meaning of life, which is the salvation of the soul. When man believes in God and in the future life, then he understands the vanity of this present life and prepares his passport for the other life. We forget that all of us will leave this life. None of us are going to put roots down here. This present life is not for us to have a good time. On the contrary, it is meant for us to be tested and to pass over into the future, eternal life. Our goal here must be to prepare ourselves so we can depart

with our conscience at ease when God calls us close to Him. When Christ blessed the five loaves and satisfied the hunger of thousands of people, they immediately decided that He was the ideal person to become their king! They ate the five loaves and the two fish and were enthusiastic. But Christ told them not to be concerned about this earthly bread, for they are not destined to remain here on earth.2 In this life, everyone is tested to see if he measures up to what God asks of him.

# Question: What must we always keep in mind in order to do God's will?

we are here in this life. We didn't come here to do everything and be comfortable. We came to prepare ourselves for the other life. So our mind must constantly be there and on anything that will help us to get there. By facing this responsibility with philotimo and by undertaking a humble and philotimo-filled struggle we can understand the meaning of the spiritual life. The spiritual life is a brave undertaking, a spiritual feast. Do you have any idea what it means to have a feast, a glendi? It means grasping the deeper meaning of monasticism, of spiritual nobility, of patristic sensitivity. Everyone has the responsibility of understanding the deeper meaning of life; not of monasticism, but of life. If they did this, then people wouldn't be mean and petty, nor would they grumble with one another. Since there is divine retribution, let's be looking to earn some spiritual cash for there, and not how to maintain our dignity and enjoy human honour and esteem. When man places himself in the realm of real life, he enjoys everything. He rejoices in living and he rejoices in dying. Not because he is tired of living, but because he will die and go to Christ.

# Question: Geronda, how can we rejoice in this life when God permits suffering?

Pe rejoices because he can see that this life is temporary, while the other is eternal. He's not tired of life, but he thinks, "What are we doing, aren't we leaving?" and he prepares himself for there, because he understands that this is his destiny, the meaning of life. Social workers are very kind, and work very hard to help others in need. For example, a social worker goes to console and encourage a man with one leg, and he says to her, "You can tell me 'Good morning' with two legs, but I with only one." What can she say to him? How can she help him with psychology? If this person isn't helped to understand the deeper meaning of life, he can't be helped at all. Even if others walked with four legs, he could say, "Thank you God, for making me able to walk even with one leg." He must understand that if he doesn't grumble about this disability permitted by God, he will be storing up a considerable heavenly reward in the other life.

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# **CONQUERING YOUR FEARS**

Want to give the Holy Light of the Resurrection victory over all your fears? Saint John Climacus shows us how:

Fear is a childish feeling of the adult but empty soul. Fear is really a lack of faith that becomes obvious when we think of what unforeseen things might happen. It is lack of trust in God. The proud soul is a slave to fear precisely because it trusts in itself and so shudders at any noise or any shadow. Those who are contrite for their sins have no fear.

So if there are places where you are normally afraid to go, do not hesitate to frequent them even at dead of night, armed with prayer. Your fear is a child-ish and ridiculous thing, but if you give way to it only a little, it will take root in your heart and stay with you. So arm yourself with prayer and when you reach the spot lambast the enemy in the name of Jesus. There is no stronger weapon in earth or heaven than that.

And when you are cured of your fear, sing the praises of the One who has freed you. If you thank Him, He will always protect you. Sometimes only the body is afraid and the fear has not spread to the soul, then you are nearly cured. The one who serves God, fears his Lord and no other. The one who does not fear his Lord is scared even of his own shadow.
