

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

It is hard to believe that entering the year 2015 we are now in the third calendar year at the beautiful new church home where we have resided as a community since June 22, 2013.

Some who have been around from even before the process of planning, funding and building our new church began can go back in their minds to a time when it all seemed so impossible. Where would we find a new property? How would we finance such a project? Who would buy our old facility? These and many other challenges and questions stood in the way for years, but by the grace of God we were inspired, stengthened and motivated to accomplish what the Lord knew we could do even before we took the first step.

Having now settled, worshipped, taught, volunteered, celebrated and lived in this beautiful new testament of faith for the last 19 months, it is easy to leave the memory of what it took to get here behind. And what did it take? A complete community-wide focus, vision and plan. After all, Proverbs 20.18 says, "Plans are established by counsel," through both internal and external counsel, God provided. The importance of that counsel and planning must never be forgotten, because it is also needed to continue moving us forward.

Likewise, in raising the funds for building and growing the facility for ministry, it was an uphill climb, and a steep one! Again, with much prudence and wisdom, the community choose to refrain breaking ground until half our pledged money was in hand and a financing plan for the entire project was formed. This again follows a good scriptural model from the Gospel according to St. Luke: "Which of you, desiring to build a tower, does not first sit down and count the cost, whether he has enough to complete it? (Luke 14.28.)

Even after all that wise counsel and good planning, it was still not possible until the pledging, giving and committment reached sacrificial levels that equaled the levels of desire for the type of facility and breadth of ministry the Lord had planted in our hearts.

Now that it we have moved in and gotten comfortable, it seems that "our work is done." The most important thing to remember is this: "OUR WORK IS NOT DONE!" Heading into our first post-construction "normal" full year of occupancy and budgeting, the dust has settled, the ministries are growing, we are reaching out in ways never seen before and we should be starting to realize what it really takes to run a place of this magnitude.

As we enter the new year, many people look for resolutions. Both Father John Androutsopoulos (page 5) and Spero the Church Mouse (page 7) have offered a few. Attend services and studies regularly and you will collect many more.

Above and beyond that, there are two resolutions I will in love offer every member of this community to help us each step up the level of support God is calling us to provide so that this Church will be able to be "Faith. Family. Community." for many for years to come:

- 1. I WILL ASSIST IN FREEING HOLY TRINITY CHURCH OF ITS MORTGAGE BY MAKING A CAPITAL CAMPAIGN PLEDGE IF I HAVE NOT MADE ONE OR EXTENDING MY PLEDGE IF I HAVE ALREADY PARTICIPATED.
- 2. I WILL MEET MY COMMITMENT TO MY LORD AND MY CHURCH BY RAIS-ING MY STEWARDSHIP SUPPORT TO THE SACRIFICIAL LEVEL NEEDED TO SUSTAIN AND GROW THE NEW LIFE OF THIS COMMUNITY.

With boldness, courage and God's blessing, we have established a "new normal" of life and ministry that now requires a "new normal" of support: sacrificial. All are welcome at whatever level God puts in your heart and in your accounts. What a joy to use it for the glory of God in 2015!

Fast-Free Celebration of the Nativity Dec. 25-Jan.4

In celebration of the Feast of the Nativity of the Lord, please note that the holy canons indicate that there is no fasting from December 25-January 4. This refers, of course, to the daily fasts of the church and does not eliminate the eucharistic fast (no food or drink from the time of waking up until Liturgy) for those receiving Holy Communion. Question? Please see Father John or Father Radu. Christ is born! Glorify Him!

New Year's Eve Liturgy/Celebration..... December 31 Want to start the New Year out "on the right foot?" Well, point that foot toward Holy Trinity Church and start your evening with the first Divine Liturgy of the New Year by celebrating the Feast of Saint Basil with Vesperal Liturgy at 6:00 p.m., followed by an exciting New Year's Eve Celebration featuring the live Greek band "The Levendes" from Detroit. Be sure to prepare as usual for an evening Liturgy, with no food or drink following your noon meal, and of course the appropriate prayers of preparation for Holy Communion. There is no better way to sanctify yourself, your family and the entire New Year. "Kali Hronia!" Happy New Year to all!

Mon., Jan. 5: The Forefeast of Theophany

This is the first of two Theophany Divine Liturgies and services of Great Blessings of the Waters. It is an <u>evening Liturgy</u>, so be sure to prepare properly to receive Holy Communion by (in addition to your other spiritual preparation) abstaining from food and drink from your noon meal on. The Liturgy will be followed by the Great Blessing of the Waters service. Please note that this is also a strict fasting day in preparation for Theophany. (HT)

Tue., Jan. 6: The Holy Theophany of our LordThis is the main Orthros and Divine Liturgy of this great Feast. We will again offer the Great Blessings of the Water at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy. (HT)

Wed. Jan. 7: The Synaxis of St. John the Baptist
This feast of the "greatest of the prophets" and Forerunner of Christ is held on the day after Theophany. (SG)

Sat. Jan. 17: Saint Anthony the Great

The feast of Saint Anthony will be celebrated at the Saint Anthony parish in Clairton. Watch the bulletin for details.

Fri. Jan. 30: The Three Hierarchs

Divine Liturgy for the feast of the Three Hiearchs, St. Basil the Great, St. Gregory the Theologian and St. John Chrysostom (SG).

Prayer For The New Year

"Dear Father, as we begin a new year, we pray that all bitterness, and wrath, and malice, and anger, and evil speaking shall be put away from among us, and that we shall be kind to one another. Help us, Father, to be faithful to Thee. In the name of Thy Son Jesus. Amen."

Prayer Thoughts For The New Year

Pray earnestly every day for a deeper love and earnestness in God's service; for a stronger resolve properly to use Word and Sacraments of Holy Confession and Holy Communion; for a clean heart; for worthy dedication of self and possessions; for peace and concord; for the sick of body and mind, the distressed and weak-hearted; pray that God may comfort and bless them; for the Church and the faithful and dedicated priests; that the peace of Christ may rule in your heart and be expressed in your life; that you may abide in God's love and keep His commandments.

Stewardship Thoughts For The New Year

It is well to remember, on this first Sunday of the year, that we cannot get something for nothing. Gambling is getting nothing for something. New Year's resolutions are good, if they are backed up with earnest prayer for help in keeping them. A salesman tried to sell a farmer a book on how to be a better farmer. The farmer said that he did not want the book, for he already knew how to be a better one than he was. Most of us know how to be much better Christians than we are. Let us resolve to try tithing this year, for tithing members make a good Church. A tithing Church never has financial troubles. The Jews were commanded to give the tenth; Christians should give even more.

How To Grow In Grace For The New Year And The Completion Of Our Lives

What do we mean "by the Grace of God?" I believe that it means God's matchless, overpowering love and favor.

"Be like newborn babies, always thirsty for the pure spiritual milk, so that by drinking it you may grow up and be saved. (1 Peter 2:2) When the sinner is spiritually regenerated—born again (1 John 3:3, 5-7)—he starts a new life similar to an infant in the physical realm. The same rules that promote health in babies must be followed to enjoy spiritual growth. Beloved, as Christians, we need:

- 1. The "Pure Milk Of The Word" Is The Proper Formula. We must study and absorb the teachings of the Holy Scriptures. "Do your best to win full approval in God's sight, as a worker who is not ashamed of his work, one who correctly teaches the message of God's truth. (2:Timothy 2:15)
- 2. Daily Prayer: The "Oxygen Of The Soul." If we do not have it, we will faint (1 Thess. 5:17). Pray at all times. Beloved, the Christians sweetest privilege is the privilege of talking to God, for that's what prayer is. It is a sad day in the Christian's life when he begins to neglect his prayer life. It is as if God had given us a blank check, which He had signed, and we tear up the check. It is as if God had given us the key of His great Heavenly storehouse, and we threw the key away. Are we neglecting this privilege?
- **3. Get Busy In Christian Work And Bear Witness To Others In Every Way Possible.** "Whoever declares publicly that he belongs to me, I will do the same for him before my Father in Heaven" (Matt. 10:32).
- **4. Rely On God At All Times In Simple Faith.** "Take my yoke and put it on, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in spirit; and you will find rest. (Matt. 11:29)
- 5. Avoid Evil Company And Any Environment That Tends To Soil The Soul. "Do not be fooled: bad companions ruin good character" (1 Cor. 15:33). "And so the Lord says: you must leave them, and separate yourselves from them. Have nothing to do with what is unclean, and I will accept you" (2 Cor. 6:17).
- **6. Support Your Church.** The Church is of God, and shall be to the end of the world. The mission of the Church will remain the same: an instrument of God's redeeming love in the world. Where else are we to turn, except to the Church, as a redeeming agency of God, the hospital for the helpless, the hospital of sinners? So, go to Church this Sunday, and by your presence and through your support help the House of the Lord. Take your family; invite your friends and relatives; say a good word for your Church and help it to become what God has always intended to be. "Let us not give up the habit of meeting together, as some are doing. Instead, let us encourage one another, all the more since you see that the Day of the Lord is coming near. (Heb. 10:25). "But if we live in the light – just as he is in the light – then we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, His Son, makes us clean for every sin." (1 John 1:7.).
- 7. You Should Regularly Partake In Holy Communion, examine yourself, and confess all known sin. In so doing, you will keep yourself "in the love of God." "If we would examine ourselves first, we would not come under God's judgment." (1 Cor. 11:31)

May the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God the Father, and the communion of the Holy Spirit, be with you.

Spero | Mouse Tales: The St. Spyridon Church School Library Update

Hello, my precious children!

Happy New Year! I can't believe it's already 2015! There are so many good things happening here at Holy Trinity Church and in my Saint Spyridon Children's Lending Library.

One of the great (and delicious) celebrations of the Church year is "Vasilopita" (which means, "Saint Basil's Bread"). It's so..o..o tasty, and it reminds us of a great saint who did a lot for the Church and a lot for the poor and needy. Did you know he was the first bishop in the Church to set up orphanages to take care of Our Heavenly Father's precious children who did not have food, clothing or even parents? Or that he was—along with the other two famous bishops of his day (Saint John Chrysostom and Saint Gregory the Theologian)—very well-educated in Greek philosophy and other subjects? In



fact, these "Three Hierarchs" are so well-respected as scholars that they are known as the patron saints of "Greek Letters," or higher learning. Over 1,600 years later, they still set great examples of learning and faith for us to follow today. May they bless your New Year of studies and school work so you may excel in all things!

You know, as part of the New Year, a lot of people like to make up things to do in the coming year. They call them, "New Year's resolutions." Sometimes they are really good things, other times they are a little silly. Well, I, Spero, am here to help my precious children with their resolutions this year. Yiayia has taught me and Zoe a lot of good lessons over the years, and I thought I would put some of them together for you as resolutions. Here they are!

<u>I will trust God more this year</u>: Yiayia says many people ask how to get to heaven. She always tells them: "there is only one way: through Jesus Christ." We must place our trust in Him because He is the precious Son of God Who was sent by our Heavenly Father to save us. We trust God when we go to Him and tell Him we are sorry for disobeying Him and we ask for His forgiveness. And we trust God when we let Him and others around us know that we believe that Jesus really does save us and love us. There are lots of ways to do this in the New Year. Try to come up with your own!

<u>I will tell the truth this year:</u> It sometimes seems easier to tell a "small" lie than to face the truth when we get into trouble, but Yiayia says we should always tell the truth because our Heavenly Father loves truth and tells us not to lie. Lying only gets us into trouble. Yes, we can go back and ask forgiveness of others and of God, but why not just tell the truth from the start? It's easier and it's more Christian. There are some good Bible verses that tell us this: 1 Corinthians 13:6, 2 Corinthians 4:2 and Exodus 20:16. Look them up!

<u>I will listen to my heart more this year</u>: You know what happens when we do something wrong and we get that funny feeling in our heart or our conscience bothers us? We feel bad because we have done something to hurt someone else or let God down. 

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

The Feast of Theophany and the Blessing of Homes and Businesses

"At Your Ephiphany, the whole creation sang Your praises. For You, our God, have appeared on earth and dwelt among men. You have sanctified the streams of the Jordan, sending down from on high the most Holy Spirit."

From the Service of the Great Blessing of the Waters



"What is Theophany?"

Every year on January 6th, the Orthodox Church celebrates the Feast of Holy Theophany, which is the baptism of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. This is one of the Twelve Great Feasts of the Church and is also known by the name, "Epiphany." The Baptism of Christ in the River Jordan at the hand of St. John the Baptist sets the example for our own baptism by water in the Holy Spirit.

"How do we celebrate Theophany?"

The main celebration is, of course, found in the Church with the holy services on January 5th (the Forefeast), January 6th (Theophany) and January 7th (Synaxis of St. John the Baptist). We also take the feast home with us by having our homes blessed with the Holy Water.

"What happens during a House Blessing?"

You will receive a call to confirm your appointment a day or two ahead. When the priest arrives, he will conduct a brief

service either in your dining room or at the place where your family usually offers its prayers. It is best to have the entire family present if possible, especially children. Please be sure to have an icon and a list of the first names of all the members of your household. If you have a home censer, you may prepare it also. A bowl of water is not necessary, as the priest will bring the holy water sprinkler from the church.

The priest will offer the blessing service and offer the names of the people present and those contained on the family names list in prayer. As the service concludes, please lead the priest throughout the house to sprinkle the holy water while chanting the hymn of Theophany. He will bring a copy of the service so you can follow along and chant the hymn. When the service is over,

please understand if your priest needs to keep the visit brief in order to cover all the homes scheduled on that day.

"Should I Have Our House and Business Blessed Every Year?"

Yes! In the Orthodox Christian tradition, homes should be blessed each year to bring the blessings of the Feast of Theophany into the home and to rededicate ourselves and our family to the Lord. It is an annual commitment, celebration, thanksgiving and family prayer. It is also a pious way of asking God's blessings on our business and livelihood as good stewards of all His gifts.

Ask the Elders | Spiritual Life in the Family (continued)

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred to as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many books have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to be blessed by their words.

Question: Geronda, isn't it perhaps too difficult for someone living in the world to maintain spiritual practices?

o, there are lay people who live very spiritually; some even live like ascetics, with their fasting, their attendance at prayer services, their reciting of the Jesus Prayer, their prostrations, even though they may have children

and grandchildren. Glory be to God, for there are many such souls in the world. As a matter of fact, I know a family man who continually recites the Jesus Prayer, no matter where he is. His prayer became auto-activated and his tears are sweet; they are tears of divine exultation.

Elder Paisios

How simple spiritual life is! If one comes to love God, if one comes to recognise His great sacrifice and His good works, and if one exerts himself, with discernment, in imitation of the saints, he will be quickly sanctified. It is enough that he be humbled, that he be conscious of his own wretchedness and his tremendous ingratitude towards God.

Question: Geronda, should the entire family offer their evening prayers together?

he older family members should bestir themselves with nobility; they should lead by example. They should [offer their evening prayers] and say to the younger family members, "You can stay with us for a little while, if you want." If the children are somewhat older, they can set up a rule; for example, fifteen minutes for the older children; two to five minutes for the younger children; and after that, as much as they want. If the parents make them stay for the entire [evening prayer], they'll just end up resenting it. They mustn't pressure them, because they haven't yet grasped the power and value of prayer. For example, parents can eat beans and meat; they can eat all types of foods. But when a little child is still only drinking milk, are his parents going tell him to eat meat just because it's more nutritious? It may be nutritious, but the poor child can't digest it. This is why small children are given just a little meat and broth to start out with, so they'll want more.

Question: But sometimes adults are so tired in the evening that even they can't pray the evening prayers.

hen they are very tired or sick, they should just pray half of the [evening prayers], or at least say the Lord's Prayer. They shouldn't bypass prayer altogether. As in time of war, if at night you find yourself alone on a hill and surrounded by the enemy, you'll fire out an ocscasional shot to scare the enemy away and keep him at bay. They, too, should let out a shot of prayer to keep the devil away.

Question: Geronda, if a husband doesn't live spiritually, what should his wife do?

he should entrust him to Christ and pray that his heart be softened. Eventually, little by little, Christ will descend in his heart, and he will start speculating. As soon as his heart is somewhat softened, then she can ask him, for example, to drive her to church. She shouldn't say to him, "Come to church with me," but: "Can you please take me as far as the church?" If he takes her all the way to church, then he might say to himself, "I've come this far; why don't I go inside and light a candle?" In this way, little by little, he may make progress.

Question: How should parents motivate their children to attend the holy services and live a spiritual life?

n order for a child to be on the path of God, his parents must be living a proper spiritual life. Some parents who are religious strive to help their children become good persons, not because they are concerned about the salvation of their souls, but because they just want to have good children. In other words, they tend to be more concerned about what other people will say about their children, instead of whether or not the children might go to hell. But then, how can they expect God to help them? The point is not to force the children to go to church, but to help the children get to know and love the Church. Children shouldn't feel pressured to be good; they should feel a need to be good. The parents' holy life informs the children's souls and they then naturally follow their example. As such, they grow up with devotion and with health of both flesh and spirit, without emotional traumas. If parents, out of fear of God, encourage their children, God helps and the children are helped. But if they do this out of egoism, then God does not help. Many times children suffer because of their parents' pride.

Miracles happen with the prayers of little children. Whatever they ask of God, He provides, because they have innocence, and God hears their pure prayer. I remember one time when my parents had gone to the field and left me with my two younger brothers. Suddenly the sky darkened and a torrential rainstorm broke out. We said, "What will become of our parents? How will they get back home?" The two little ones started crying. "Come here," I said to them, 'we will pray and ask Jesus to stop the rain." The three of us knelt down before the icons and started praying. In just a few minutes the rain stopped. With discernment, parents should help their children, from a young age, to draw near to Christ and to experience, from that young age, the higher joys — the spiritual ones. If children live spiritually, they will live joyfully in this life and rejoice eternally in the presence of Christ in the afterlife.
