Dear Spiritual Family and Co-Recipients of God's Endless Love.

Last evening many of the young people of our parish and their families attended a new movie, "Wonder." In it, a young boy who was born with facial differences leaves the safe haven of his home to enter a new school. It is a heart-warming and affirming story I would recommend for everyone. Though not an outwardly Christian movie, there were many themes with Christian underpinnings, especially being able to see the image of God and the goodness in ourselves and those around us.

One of the many interesting features of the movie were the crowd scenes, in which one could feel the tension between this young boy's natural desire to be accepted and loved versus the nervousness and uncertainty of others around him, who found it easier to meld into the crowd and avoid or ridicule him rather than actually getting to know him. It was interesting and instructive to see how things changed for him and for others when they risked going outside their comfort zone and into the world of personal encounters, where real human relationships are born. When they engaged him in a personal relationship, everything changed.

It is no different in our relationship with God. When we encounter Him—or better still, when He comes to encounter us-everything changes. In the quote above, Theodoret, a fifth century bishop of the early Church, notes that the Lord, in considering what method He would use to come and rescue us from our fallen state, could have chosen a distant and disconnected exercise of power as the God of the universe, but He did not. He chose to come and be with us, thus claiming one of His most personal names, "Emmanuel" ("God with us"). What a beautiful and transformative way to think about the upcoming Feast of the Nativity. He did what He did not have to do (become like us) so that we could become what we were made to be (like Him).

Here at Holy Trinity Church we have so many ways to both give and receive the message of God's love and God's presence. First and foremost, we are the Body of Christ, a worshiping community, the people of God who glorify and praise Him. During the upcoming Nativity season, please be sure to make that the center of your holiday, celebrating Christ first and then all the blessings and joy that surround His birth. We also have the ability, and indeed the calling, to be the love of God for those around us. Whether it is in providing gifts for the needy families of FOCUS Pittsburgh, singing Christmas carols for our friends, the retired nuns across the street at the Sisters of Divine Providence, or providing the visit, phone call, card or crafts to shut-in or elderly members of the community during the holidays, each offering of love says, "You are not alone." Mother Teresa reminded us about how powerful and important it is to reach out in those times when she said, "The most terrible poverty is loneliness, and the feeling of being unloved."

So, this Christmas, as always, start with worship and praise of the One Who Came To Be With Us. Then, whatever you can do to share His love, please do it. Everyone can do something. Christ is Born! Paternally yours, Glorify Him...and share His love!

Advent: The Fast of Christmas and the Preparation for the Nativity

Advent is a Latin word which means "The Coming." It is used in the life of the Church to signify the visible coming of the Son of God into this world.

The Two Comings of Christ

Holy Scripture bears witness to that "coming" of the Son of God taking place at two different times.

The first coming of Christ took place when the Son of God was conceived by the Holy Spirit in the womb of the most pure Virgin Mary, and born of her in the stable of Bethlehem according to the flesh and was made man, sanctifying the world by His coming, for which many kings and prophets had been waiting.

The second coming of Christ will take place at the end of the world, when Christ shall come in great majesty to judge the living and the dead.

The Purpose of the Fast

The Fast of Christmas (Advent - the Season of Hope), which begins on November 15, is a time of anticipation, a time of hope, a time for reflection, a time of preparation, a time of getting ready for Christmas the great and Holy Feast of the Nativity of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

The world may not know what "Advent" means or when it begins, or even that there is; such a season in the Christian year; but it does know that there is something called "Christmas" coming, and that if we want the most of it, now is the time to get ready for it.

How We Prepare

Stores, radio and television commercials, city officials make sure that decorations go up and the announcers hammer away with the "hard sell." What are our Advent preparations? How are we getting ready for Christmas? To make the most of Christmas, we have to get ready for it. Hopefully, let us begin, to make the most of our time, realizing that the more we use the Advent days to listen to what Advent says, the more we will profit from our Christmas celebrating when it comes. Christmas this year is going to be, as it always is, another reenactment of the greatest event in history; and we can't come up to something like that without careful preparation.

Thoughts About Avent

ADVENT teaches us to do some spiritual shopping for Christmas. ADVENT should be a season of spiritual awakening for the soul. Fasting, prayer, and the sacraments of repentance, confession: and Holy Communion make the soul

alive and exceedingly happy.

The Greatest Thing

My beloved, "The greatest thing that could happen is going to happen. God is going to visit His world. The Promised One is coming. Get ready to meet Him."

We can be ready to meet our Savior through prayer, fasting, through the Sacraments of repentance, confession and Holy Communion, by attending Church Services during Advent. Christmas is coming. Get ready for it!

Our Christmas Gift to Jesus

"It is, more blessed to give than to receive."
(Acts 20: 35)

How blessed the wise men were in being able to bring gifts to the Holy Babe and to adore Him as they knelt before Him! Their hearts were filled with joy as they left that place.

Everyone who loves Jesus with all his heart wants to give Him love, coming out of a heart full of gratitude. We want to bring Him our best gift - the one He desires most. So we surrender our lives to Him that He may reign over us.

Jesus our Lord and Savior never refuses a gift given with a loving heart. When we open our hearts to Jesus, He enters and fills us with an immense and overflowing joy. His gifts are much bigger than ours. He gives in abundance. How wonderful to be His faithful servants!

Holy Trinity Church Honored With The Investiture of Our First Archon

An in-person account by George Athanasiou

On Sunday October 22, 2017, twenty-four men from throughout the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America were invested into the Order of St Andrew the Apostle, as Archons of the Ecumenical Patriarchate. This year, Holy Trinity's own Harry Athanasiou was among this select group. This was a very historic moment for our community as Harry became the first Archon in the 95-year history of Holy Trinity.

Harry traveled to New York City with his wife Joyce and their sons George and Fr. Anastasios to participate in a weekend filled with fellowship, education and worship. On Friday evening October 20th, the Archons-elect and their families joined other Archon families at The Metropolitan Club in Manhattan in celebration of the 2017 Nicholas J. Bouras Award for Extraordinary Archon Stewardship at the annual Award Presentation and Dinner Dance which recognized the accomplishments of Archon John A. Catsimatidis, New York City businessman and politician.

On Saturday, Harry and Joyce along with the other Archons-elect and their spouses spent much of the day learning and understanding what it means to be an Archon and the new responsibilities and expectations that they were about to undertake. They were constantly reminded that this was not a lifetime achievement award. This was not an award that was to sit on a mantel in recognition of past services offered to the Church. Rather, this was the beginning of a new level of stewardship to the Church and the advancement of the initiatives of the Ecumenical Patriarchate in Constantinople.

It was during this program that each Archon-elect was informed of the Offikion (office/title) that would be bestowed

upon them at the investiture on Sunday. The title that each Archon bears, stems from the Byzantine period. Through the Ecumenical Patriarchate, most of the traditional Byzantine imperial and ecclesiastical titles have been preserved. Thus, the specific titles bestowed to the Archons of the Order of St. Andrew by Patriarch Bartholomew and his predecessors, in many cases, stretch back 1000 years or more. Harry received the title "Archon Euftaxias," which is most closely understood as the "master of ceremonies" or "one who establishes order." Although ceremonial, these titles are selected following close examination of the candidate's background, both in civil and ecclesiastical work and assigned to each by His All Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew.

On Saturday evening, the Order of Saint Andrew the Apostle honored Nobel Peace Prize nominees Emilia Kamvisi and Eftratios Valamios, who represented the fisherman of the island of Lesbos and the Greek Islands, with the 2017 Athenagoras Human Rights Award during their Grand Banquet at the New York Hilton Midtown. The Athanasiou family was among the seven-hundred attendees who gathered to celebrate this prestigious award.

Finally, on Sunday at the close of the Divine Liturgy the Archons-elect were invested as official members of the Order of St Andrew the Apostle. His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios, Geron of America, assisted by their Eminences Metropolitan Maximos of Selyvria, Savas of Pittsburgh, Evangelos of New Jersey, Gerasimos of San Francisco and their Graces Bishops Demetrios of Xanthos and Sebastian of Zela blessed each Archon with their cross and offikia, reading

the proclamation of their office and exclamation of "Axios" (worthy), to which the entire congregation responded, Axios!

As previously stated, Harry's work has just begun. Each year the Archons gather for retreats, pilgrimages to the Patriarchate, and conferences which focus on religious freedom. Harry will travel this December to our nation's capital, Washington D.C. for the 3rd Archon International Conference on Religious Freedom focusing on "The Persecution of Christians in the Holy Lands & The Middle East: Consequences and Solutions." May the work of our Archons be blessed and fruitful.

Feature Article | Saint George Chapel Iconography Completed



"Breathtaking"

Breathtaking...Stepping through the doors of the St. George Chapel, I found myself transported to another era of time. I was not only immersed in the vibrant colors of the newly painted icons but also felt that I was wrapped in the loving

embrace of God. Meeting and interviewing the artist, Florin Vlad, was an honor and a delightful plus to this enlightening experience. I was led through the process of the creation

of these magnificent representations of our faith through the life and experience of the iconographer himself.

Florin is a humble man when it comes to his talents and his skills. Born in Romania, he was interested in drawing since the time he was a child. After completing his service in the army there, he enrolled in The School of Religious Church Painting in 1984. He finished his schooling in 1991 and learned to paint frescoes (the art of painting on fresh plaster with water based paint) through apprenticeships with masters of this type of




February 19, 2008: Florin completes the first icon of the Chapel - The Pantokrator.

throughout Canada.

According to his training, an iconographer does not sign his paintings, so his signature is found nowhere in the Chapel.

It follows the teaching that the works stand on their own merits, not on those of the iconographer, and are a result of many years of studying the skills of painting icons, following ancient protocols for the representation of each figure, as well as garnering inspiration for this holy task.

Holy Trinity's Saint George's Chapel is Florin's first and only work in the United States. This project was begun in 2008 while the church still resided on the North Side. Most of the icons were painted directly on the wall during his many months here, but some of the panels were painted by on canvas by Florin during his travels to cities and countries across the world such as Canada, Netherlands and Romania. After completing various canvases in studios at different locations, they were transported to the Chapel, where he installed them using a special mounting process. The last of the panels, those of the altar back wall and front walls of the Chapel, were actually back brought from Mississauga, Ontario, to Pittsburgh during a "Byzantine road trip" by Father John and Harry Athanasiou.

The iconography project was "a fertile collaboration" between Florin, Father John and the Holy Trinity community. Sketches of the entire project were done and then submitted to His Eminence Metropolitan Maximos (our ruling hierarch at that time) for approval. Influenced by Byzantine roots, icons in the Orthodox church have been depicted over the ages in much the same manner. Those of Jesus, Virgin Mary, Saint Peter, to name a few, should be able to be recognized and identified by the observer. Composition (and really everything) in the icon is very important, and the placement of the scene in the church also must be according to Orthodox tradition. Even the ornaments and designs that surround the icons are in a standard style. Florin explains that for this project he used acrylic paints and gold leaf. But in all cases, the

preparation must match the surface and be painted in a way that the icon will also be preserved and survive over time. Before my visit, he was working on applying gold leaf, a very intricate process, to the halo of a saint.

The design and content of the Saint George Chapel was intended to match the theme and environment of its surround-

ings. Because it stands on the same plot of ground as the Holy Trinity Cemetery, there were certain scenes in this venue that were important. They represent not only the trees and

other environs outdoors, but also death and resurrection. "You can not see only the famous resurrections depicted throughout time, but also those which are to come on Judgment Day," says Florin. Of particular inspiration for the dome interior was the "Parecclesion" Chapel in the Church of the Holy Savior in Chora, a famous 14th century church outside Constantinople, known for its intricate and stunning frescoes of the Resurrection, the Second Coming and the Last Judgement. Father John asked Florin to recreate these scenes in our Chapel after

a pilgrimage to Constantinople. resulting in a particularly fascinating composite work as we see those souls that are called to Judgment Day surrounded by the sea, earth and souls that were consumed by animals or drowned. Balancing those depictions with hope are the glorious scenes of Resurrection and the Entry of the Saints into Paradise.

As we enter the chapel and look up, we can see the scene of the Falling

Asleep of the Most Blessed Theotokos. This is a common placement of this particular scene. "The chapel is more about Resurrection than about death, however, because it is important to give hope to those who come here to worship and those burying their loved ones", he adds.

Florin has been here since July, and during this trip, he has been a very active part of the Holy Trinity community. During our festival this summer, he volunteered and worked along side other parishioners. He described the festival as a highlight of being at Holy Trinity and enjoyed meeting and talking to the many people who attended. "This congregation is very dynamic", he says. "They really know how to create programs to keep people close to the church". At the end of November, he will return home to be with his wife and family. One of God's Greatest Gifts To Us

s we come to a close of another year it provides us with an opportunity to reflect on the accomplishments, challenges and opportunities we encountered throughout the year. We also remember the numerous gifts God has bestowed upon us that we sometimes don't always remember to fully cherish and embrace.

You might be wondering what particular gift we are talking about? Is it our health, finances, our home, church, family or jobs? Well, why all these things are important and truly gifts from God, there is one gift He gave us that never loses value, is applicable for every area of our lives, and pays out dividends a thousand times more that anything we could ever own. This gift is God's Word...the Bible!

If you have never attended a Wednesday evening Bible Study session at Holy Trinity then you are truly missing out. Our own Fr. Radu leads it as part of the "Faith and Family Weekdays" ministry and we are currently studying the book of Romans. In fact there are several studies referencing how often the bible is read that reveal some staggering and sad statistics.

One particular example from the 2014 Religious Landscape Study published by the Pew Research Center revealed that only 35% of Americans read scripture once a week. The number is even lower amongst Orthodox Christians coming in at 29%!! Quoted from a study published by the LifeWay Research stated, "God's Word is truth, so it should come as no surprise that reading and studying the Bible are still the activities that have the most impact on growth in this attribute of spiritual maturity. You simply won't grow if you don't know

God and spend time in God's Word."

The Bible teaches us how to live our lives and appropriately manage our time, talents and treasures in service to God. We also come to know God in ways we have never known before. We face a multitude of situations on daily basis and many times are unsure how to approach them. God teaches us through His Word that we are not alone and He is there to teach us how to function in the world we live.

You might ask yourself what are other benefits can we receive from this great gift? According to 2 Timothy 3:15-16 "The Holy Scriptures are able to give you the wisdom that leads to salvation. All Scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching the truth, rebuking error, correcting faults and giving instruction for living rightly. Another benefit is seen in Romans 15:4 that states: "Everything written in the Scriptures was written to teach us in order that we might have hope through the patience and encouragement that the Scriptures give us." Lastly, St. John Chrysostom (354-407 AD) said: "Reading the Scriptures is like possessing a great treasure. A Christian cannot help but read the Scriptures. To be a Christian is to rejoice in the power of the Holy Spirit and the Spirit speaks to us through the Scriptures."

As you can see it is the responsibility of us all to be good Stewards over everything God has given us, particularly His Word. This is truly one of the greatest gifts He has given us so why not increase your engagement by attending the next Bible Study, make study of the Word a part of your daily routine and see how God will continue to make Himself known to you in ways you might have never thought were possible.

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred to as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many books have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to inspired by their wisdom.

Gheronda, how should we respond to those who offend or insult us?

hen someone injures us in whatever way, whether with slanders or with insults, we should think of him as our brother who has been taken hold of by the enemy. He has fallen victim to the enemy. Accordingly we need to have compassion for him and entreat

God to have mercy both on us and on him, and God will help both. If, however, we are filled with anger against him, then the enemy will jump from him to us and make a mockery of us both. A person who condemns others does not love Christ. Our egotism is at fault. This is where condemnation of others stems from. Let me give you a little example.

Let's suppose someone is all alone in the desert. Suddenly he hears a voice crying out in distress in the distance. He follows the sound and is confronted by a horrendous sight: a tiger has grabbed hold of a man and is savaging him with its claws. The man is desperately shouting for help. In a few minutes he will be torn to pieces. What can the person do to help? Can he run to his side? How? It's impossible. Can he shout for help? Who will hear him? There is no one within earshot. Should he perhaps pick up a stone and throw it at the man to finish him off? 'Certainly not,' we would say. But that's is exactly what can happen if we don't realize that the other person who is acting badly towards us has been taken hold of by a tiger, the devil. We fail to realize that when we react to such a person without love it is as if we are throwing stones at his wounds and accordingly we are doing him great harm and the 'tiger' leaps onto us and we do the same as him and worse. What kind of love do we have then for our neighbor and, even more importantly, for God?

We should feel the malice of the other person as an illness which is tormenting him and which he is unable to shake off. And so we should regard our brethren with sympathy and behave with courtesy towards them, repeating in our hearts with simplicity the prayer 'Lord Jesus Christ', so that the grace of God may strengthen our soul and so that we don't pass judgment on anyone. We should regard all people as saints. We all carry within us the same 'old self'. Our neighbor, whoever he is, is 'flesh of our flesh; he is our brother and, according to Saint Paul, we owe no one anything, except to love one another. We can never pass judgment on others, for no one ever hated his own flesh.

Is this what Jesus means when He says, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you?"

hen someone has a vice we should try to bombard him with rays of love and compassion so that he may be cured and freed. These things are achieved only through the grace of God. Think that this person is suffering

more than you. In a coenobitic monastery when someone is at fault, we should not tell him that he is to blame. We must adopt an attitude of care, respect and prayer. We must endeavour not to do anything harmful. When we endure insults from our brother, it counts as martyrdom. And it is something we should endure with joy.

A Christian is gracious. We should prefer to be wronged. If love enters us we forget the wrongs we have been done. This is where the secret lies. When the evil comes from afar, you cannot avoid it. The great art, however, is to show disdain for it. With the grace of God, even though you see it, it will not affect you, because you will be full of grace.

Gheronda, this is very different from our every day experience of life in the world.

n the realm of the Spirit of God all things are different. Here one justifies all things in the behaviour of others. Everything! What have we said? Christ sends rain on the just and on the unjust. I say that you are to blame, even if you tell me that he or she is the one at fault. In the final analysis you are to blame in some respect and you will discover in what respect you are at fault when I tell you that you are to blame. You should acquire this sense of discrimination in your life. Inquire more deeply into everything and don't regard things superficially. If we don't go to Christ, if we don't endure patiently when we suffer unjustly, we will be tormented continually. The secret is to deal with situations in a spiritual way. Saint Symeon the New Theologian writes in a similar vein:

"We need to regard all of the faithful as one and think that each one of them is Christ. We need to have such love for each individual that we are ready to sacrifice our very life for him. Because we ought never to say or think that any person is evil, but rather to regard all as good. And if you see a brother troubled by passions, do not hate him. Hate rather the passions that are assailing him. And if you see that he is being tormented by desires and habits from former sins, have even greater compassion on him, lest you also fall into temptation, since you are made of matter that easily turns from good to evil. Love for your brother prepares you to love God more. Accordingly, the secret of love for God is love for your brother. Because if you don't love your brother whom you see, how can you possibly love God whom you don't see? He who does not love his brother whom he has seen, how can he love God whom he has not seen?"

We shouldn't be enraged by people who blaspheme or who speak and act against God and the Church. Such rage is harmful. We may hate the words and the malice behind them, but we must not hate the person who spoke them nor become enraged against him. Rather we should pray for him. A Christian has love and graciousness and should behave accordingly.
