"Christ is risen and life reigns!"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Risen Christ,

It is one of the universal practices of Orthodox Christianity that the homily offered at the Pascha Liturgy is not offered out of the individual person of the priest, but out of the collective heart and voice of the Church from throughout the ages. It is best embodied in the Paschal Homily of St. John Chrysostom from the fourth century. As we continue the bright and beautiful celebration, please allow me to simply offer it to you here once again, not in the depths of the night of the Resurrection service, but in your homes, studies, offices, kitchens and wherever you might pick this up as you live your life. It is there that this needs to be real.

Christ is risen! Truly He is risen!

"If anyone is devout and a lover of God, let him enjoy this beautiful and radiant festival. If anyone is a wise servant, let him, rejoicing, enter into the joy of his Lord. If anyone has wearied himself in fasting, let him now receive his recompense. If anyone has labored from the first hour, let him today receive his just reward. If anyone has come at the third hour, with thanksgiving let him keep the feast. If anyone has arrived at the sixth hour, let him have no misgivings; for he shall suffer no loss. If anyone has delayed until the ninth hour, let him draw near without hesitation. If anyone has arrived even at the eleventh hour, let him not fear on account of his delay. For the Master is gracious and receives the last, even as the first; he gives rest to him that comes at the eleventh hour, just as to him who has labored from the first. He has mercy upon the last and cares for the first; to the one he gives, and to the other he is gracious. He both honors the work and praises the intention.

Enter all of you, therefore, into the joy of our Lord, and, whether first or last, receive your reward. O rich and poor, one with another, dance for joy! O you ascetics and you negligent, celebrate the day! You that have fasted and you that have disregarded the fast, rejoice today! The table is rich-laden; feast royally, all of you! The calf is fatted; let no one go forth hungry!

Let all partake of the feast of faith. Let all receive the riches of goodness. Let no one lament his poverty, for the universal kingdom has been revealed. Let no one mourn his transgressions, for pardon has dawned from the grave. Let no one fear death, for the Saviour's death has set us free.

He that was taken by death has annihilated it! He descended into hades and took hades captive! He embittered it when it tasted his flesh! And anticipating this Isaiah exclaimed, "Hades was embittered when it encountered thee in the lower regions." It was embittered, for it was abolished! It was embittered, for it was mocked! It was embittered, for it was purged! It was embittered, for it was despoiled! It was embittered, for it was bound in chains! It took a body and, face to face, met God! It took earth and encountered heaven! It took what it saw but crumbled before what it had not seen! "O death, where is thy sting? O hades, where is thy victory?"

Christ is risen, and you are overthrown! Christ is risen, and the demons are fallen! Christ is risen, and the angels rejoice! Christ is risen, and life reigns! Christ is risen, and not one dead remains in a tomb! For Christ, being raised from the dead, has become the First-fruits of them that slept."

To Him be glory and might unto ages of ages. Amen.


Upcoming Liturgical Dates June

Feast Day Weekend June 10-12

Please note the schedule of services for the Feast Day Weekend of our parish, June 10-12. First is the annual Saturday of Souls Liturgy at the St. George Chapel at Holy Trinity Cemetery. Pentecost Sunday features the Divine Liturgy, Kneeling Service and the Feast Day Picnic at Bellevue Park. Monday will, of course, celebrate the Feast Day Liturgy of our Church. Here is the complete schedule:



Saturday, June 10 - 8:30 am Orthros/9:30 am Liturgy: Saturday of the Souls Liturgy at St. George Chapel at Holy Trinity Cemetery. Experience the timelessness of Orthodoxy with your family, while honoring and remembering all of those who have preceded us. *This will be the first Pentecost Saturday of the Souls at the St. George Chapel.*

9:30 Regular Divine Liturgy Hours . . . Now in Effect

Riches In Christ Jesus The Joy Of Our Salvation And The Hope

*Christ is Risen!
Truly He is Risen!*

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who according to His great mercy has begotten us again unto a living hope by the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1 Peter 1:3).

Everything we need for living a happy, useful, and triumphant life we find in Christ Jesus. He added enjoyment to a happy occasion in Cana of Galilee by the miracle He performed at a marriage feast. When Jesus dined with Zacchaeus, understanding developed to such an extent that the tax gatherer was saved from a life of selfishness and greed.

It was in the home of a Pharisee that Jesus reclaimed a sinner, and all the guests became conscious of His power. It was in the breaking of bread that the *Risen Lord* was able to restore in fearful disciples the spirit of triumph.

No person and no home is ever the same after the Son of God has entered. His presence proves to be a saving power from all manner of mistakes and sins. More than that, the riches of Jesus Christ become our possessions ever increasing and more precious with each passing day.

The Lord of life, Who did identify Himself with flesh and blood, is pleased to continue His dwelling place among us. Our hearts and our homes can be sanctified by His presence and enriched by our constant fellowship with Him, the Lord and our Savior Jesus Christ. *eternal life* is foremost among the riches we have in our *Risen Lord*.

The Second Sunday In May: Mother's Day

One of the sweetest memories that anyone can have is the memory of a good mother. "When Jesus therefore saw His mother, and the disciple standing by, whom He loved, He said to His mother, 'Woman behold thy son!' Then He said to the disciple, 'Behold, thy mother!' And from that hour the disciple took Her unto his own home" (John 19:26-27). "No, Johnny," said the teacher, "that's not right. Now listen carefully." She repeated the problem again, "There are eight people at

the table. If the pie is cut into equal pieces, how much would each one of you get?" Again Johnny answered, "One-seventh." Then the teacher said, "Johnny, you don't know your fractions." Then Johnny replied, "Yes, teacher, I know my fractions, but I know my mother, too. She would say that she didn't want

Hello my precious little ones! It's I, Spero!

Have you ever known someone who is hard to get along with? You know the type: there is just something about him or her that makes being a friend a little difficult. It can be any number of things: the way they act, talk, chew their food, etc.

Well, I have a DVD called, "Stanley the Stink Bug Goes to Camp," by Max Lucado. In it, everyone is excited about the new camper at Camp Boo-Boo named Stanley. But Stanley has one problem: body odor ... he is STINKY! Everyone tries their best to put up with the unusual smell but things do not go well. When everything else fails, for the little bug, Hermie turns to his Heavenly Father and prays about this problem. He tells God that Stanley is really stinky and asks if He can fix this problem. Well do you know what? Hermie felt God answer the prayer: Maybe Stanley is not the problem. Just stop and think: why does he smell? God gives bad smells to some animals to protect themselves when they are afraid ... so maybe Stanley is just afraid! Maybe he is afraid of what all the other campers think about him, and then he starts to get stinky and it makes things worse! How about accepting Stanley for who he is, and maybe his fear ... and the awful smell ... will just go away. Woudn't you know, when the garden friends start appreciating Stanley, that's just what happens and everyone learns a precious lesson. Remember, our Heavenly Father created each of us for a special reason. And as it says in Proverbs 17.17, "A friend loves you all the time. A brother is always there to help you."



And now, something special for the Mommies. The other day, I heard one of the Church School teachers tell a story about a mother's great love for her child. I'd like to share that story with



The official "Thyranoixia" (Opening of the Doors) took place almost a year to-the-day from the groundbreaking. This historic liturgical and community event started under a tent in front of the church with the chanting of the Resurrection Orthros of Bright Monday. Since it is the Greek tradition to transfer the celebration of the Feast of St. George to the day after Pascha if it falls during Lent (which it frequently does, since its fixed date is April 23), this glorious day was held in the full joy and celebration of the Resurrection and the Nameday of the Chapel. At the end of the Orthros, His Eminence Metropolitan Maximos presided over the Opening of the Doors, which included a Blessing of the Waters and a liturgical dialogue calling upon the King of Glory (the Lord) to enter His Holy House.

Αν Μιλούσαν Τά Δάκρυα

Καί ποιός μάς είπε ότι τά δάκρυα δέν μιλούν. Μιλούν στην παγκόσμια γλώσσα της καρδιάς για νά μπορούν νά τήν διαβάζουν οί άνθρωποι όλης της γής και όποιας ηλικίας.

Αν επιχειρούσαμε νά μεταφράσωμε τήν γλώσσαν των δακρύων, θά έπλημμύριζαν τήν ζωή μας όλα τά είδη των τραγουδιών, από τους θρήνων τους

άλαλαγμούς της χαράς μέχρι των σπαραγμούς, από τους παιάνες των ένθουσιασμών μέχρι τό μοιρολόι του άνέκφραστου πόνου.

Θά ξεγλιστρούσαν αὐθόρμητα οί ψιθυρισμοί από τίς μυστικές της καρδιάς μας συγκινήσεις, πού κανείς δέν θέλομε νά τίς ξέρη, τάχα ποιός μπορεί νά έρμηνεύση έσωτερικά βιώματα πού ούτε έμείς οί ίδιοι κάποτε δέν τολμούμε νά άποκρυπτογραφήσωμε.

Αν όσα λένε τά δακρυσμένα μάτια μας έγράφοντο μέ γράμματα ή μέ νότες στο πεντάγραμμο, δέν θ' άντεχε ούτε ή ματιά, ούτε ή άκοή μας τούς θρήνους, τά παράπονα, τά έρωτηματικά, τίς τύψεις, τήν ντροπή, για τά άνομολόγητα λάθη μας πού ούτε μονάχοι μας κάποτε δέν θέλομε νά παραδεχθούμε.

Καί όμως! Ό,τι δέν λένε τά χειλή και δέν γράφει το χέρι, τό δημοσιοποιεί πολλές φορές των ματιών μας τό δάκρυ. Καί τό δάκρυ μιλάει ειλικρινά, δέν γνωρίζει τήν γλώσσα της ύποκρισίας, της άδυναμίας, των ψεύτικων συναισθηματισμών. Ξαφνικά άναποδογυρίζει τό ποτήρι των διαλογισμών πού μαζεύει στης ψυχής μας τά φυλλοκάρδια τά σύννεφα, πού πυκνώνει μέσα μας κάθε είδους εύαισθησία, και άνεβάζει στα μάτια τήν βροχή των δακρύων. Άρκει νά διασχίση τόν ούρανόν της ψυχής μας ή άστραπή μιάς αλήθειας, ικανής νά τήν συγκινήση. Χαρά στόν άνθρωπο πού έχει τότε τήν εύαισθησία νά κλάψη.

Κλασσικό τό παράδειγμα μέσα στο Εύαγγέλιον

Τό άμάρτημα σχεδόν μέ τήν ίδια βαρύτητα του Ιούδα και του κορυφαίου Άποστόλου Πέτρου, ό πρώτος Τόν επρόδωσε, Τόν έπούλησεν, ό προδότης! Ό άλλος Τόν άρνήθη, έβεβαίωνε πώς δέν Τόν ξέρει και μάλιστα 'μεθ' όρκου' στην πιο κρίσιμη ώρα της ζωής Του, όταν ό Κύριος, μόνος, εγκαταλελειμμένος, έξευτελισμένος, δαρμένος, έδικάζετο για νά θανατωθή!

Όμως! Όμως ή άστραπή της αγάπης του Κυρίου έβγήκε γεμάτη στοργή και τρυφερότητα από τήν Θεϊκή ματιά Του...και πέρασε στην ματιά του Άποστόλου Του κι έφτασε στα βάθη της καρδιάς του, κι ό Μαθητής, ό γενναίος στην Πίστι και στην άυταπάρνησι, συγκλονίσθηκε 'και έξελθών έξω έκλαυσε πικρώς' (Μάρκ. σστ' 75).

Στήν κατάπικρη ώρα του πειρασμού ό Άπόστολος Πέτρος δέν άρνήθηκε τόν καλόν έαυτόν του, θυμήθηκε κάτω από τό θεϊκό χάδι εκείνης της ματιάς του Διδασκάλου του, ό, τι του είχε πεί πριν από λίγο, ότι πριν νά λαλήση ό πετεινός, θά μέ άρνηθής τρεις φορές!... Our Worship - Part 11 (The Holy Mysteries)

Part of a special series of educational features designed to provide "continuing education" to our parishioners. Taken from the publication, "Our Worship," which examines and explains the main elements of worship in the Orthodox Christian Church.

Living the Sacramental Life

Jesus described the Kingdom of God as a seed.

- How is it implanted and nurtured in us?
- How does the seed grow, so that everything in our lives becomes a "means of grace"?
- How does the seed mature so that we see the whole world as a "sacrament" of God?
- How does the seed grow and make us partakers of the Kingdom of God?

The answer is ...

by our regular and faithful participation in the Sacramental Life of the Church!

Through the "leaven" of the Holy Mysteries:

- our lives are filled with the Life of God
- the world is transformed into God's Kingdom
- reality is transfigured to reflect the radiance of the Glory of God

The Mysteries of Initiation, or Holy Illumination

At the end of the baptismal service, the priest washes the oil and Chrism from the baptized saying, "You are baptized, You are illuminated, You have been chrismated. You are sanctified. You are washed in the Name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

These words sum up the amazing action of God in baptism.

Holy Illumination consists of:

- **Exorcism** (turning away from the devil, we unite ourselves to Christ and the faith of the Church)
- **Anointing** (we are restored, renewed, and recreated in soul and body by the "oil of gladness")
- **Immersion** (in the baptismal water, we are "buried" with Christ in the water and raised to New Life)
- **Clothing** (we are now clothed a white robe, having "put on" the righteousness of Christ)
- **Chrismation** (in this "sealing" with Holy Chrism is our "personal Pentecost," the gift of the Holy Spirit)
- **Procession** (carrying candles and led by the priest, we begin our lifelong walk with the Lord while the faithful sing, "As many as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ...")
- **Holy Communion** (our bond with Christ and His Body, the Church, is fully realized as we share in the communion in the Body and Blood of Christ)
- **Ablution** or washing (as the Holy Chrism is washed off, we pray for God to preserve us in the faith and life of Christ).
- **Tonsuring** (strands of our hair are cut as a sign of the offering of all of ourselves to God)

Practical Stages of Growth in the "Sacramental Life"

1. Our "EverydayTime" is interrupted now and then by "ChurchTimes"
 - We **go to Church** on Sundays and feast days whenever we can.
2. We become more involved in worship and prayer
 - We start attending services regularly
 - We attend Vigil on Saturday evenings
 - We celebrate the feasts.
 - We begin a daily discipline of prayer
3. We live by **two** calendars: our "Everyday Calendar" and our "Church Calendar."
 - At first, one of the calendars will dominate.
 - Gradually we begin to put the two calendars together through
 - daily prayer
 - regular attendance
 - seeking to do the will of God at all times.
4. Our calendars are **integrated as one.**
 - We become aware of how the "ChurchTime" penetrates the "EverydayTime"
 - Our "ChurchTime" informs and brings hope of the Kingdom to our "EverydayTime"

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

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
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
