



He alone, being the Word of the Father and above all, was able to recreate all, and worthy to suffer on behalf of all and to be an ambassador for all with the Father. Now He entered the world in a new way, stooping to our level in His love and self-revealing to us. This He did out of sheer love for us.

St. Athanasios, "On the Incarnation" (4th century)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Do we experience Christmas from the outside in or the inside out? To find out, take a look around. During this time of year, the appearance of the world around us becomes festive and decorated. Trees and houses sprout lights and ornaments. Music changes from the standard selection of worldly fare to traditional and contemporary carols that reflect the message of the season. Food takes on a holiday flare. Even our clothes often reflect a festal mood. While we can rejoice that the world in its secular nature even <u>notices</u> Christmas anymore, it is our responsibility and calling as Orthodox Christians to not allow society, the press and the merchants to redefine this great Feast from the outside in.

One way to guard against this is to know this great Feast from the inside out. We can do this with questions such as "What happened and why?" For the Church, the message is quite clear, as stated in the passage from St. Athanasios above: because God alone was able to restore from our fallen condition, He came to us, "stooping to our level." There is an easy way to understand this. Have you ever found yourself wanting to talk with a small child? It is impossible to do effectively when he or she is only three feet tall and we are twice their height. What do we do? We "stoop to their level" so we can get closer. That simple act of self-sacrifice demonstrates to the child a love that speaks louder than words. We don't need to do it ... unless we love the child enough to humble ourself and sacrifice a bit of our adult status for a moment to do something for him or her. This is why as a priest I often find myself bending down to connect with children, whether to bring them Holy Communion or to simply relate better to them in daily encounters. It brings life closer to them.

In a similar manner, says St. Athanasios, this is what happened at the Nativity of Christ. We often think of Jesus as the baby in this scene, but perhaps it would better inform us if, in our mind's eye, we were the small child, seeing the Almighty God "stooping down" to be with us and help us understand He has come to be with us. And that scene is made even more powerful through the realization that He does it out of "sheer love for us." The importance of this self-sacrificing act of love cannot be not fully appreciated until the other great Feast—the Resurrection—when standing back up after having stooped down to embrace us, He is stretched out on the Cross to die for us and save us.

Brothers and sisters, rejoice in the feast, celebrate the holiday, having fasted and prepared properly to receive it, and please keep watch in your heart that the world does not empty it of our appreciation for and absolute dependence on that divine act of sheer love. Moreover, remember that God has both allowed and called us to be sharers in that love by passing it on to others ... even if it means that we, like Him, must humble ourselves by "stooping down" to embrace them!



# Mouse Tales: The St. Spyridon Church School Library Update | Spero




Hello, my precious children!








**Ε**ρχονται μέ τίς δροσιές του φθινοπώρου πάνω στά άγγελικά τους φτερά, νά μάς κάνουν συντροφιά οί άγγελοι τού Θεού, πού γιορτάζουν μαζί μας ίδιαίτερα πρίν νά μπή ό χειμώνας.

Τό ήμερολόγιο τής Έκκλησίας μας σημειώνει ΄8 Νοεμβρίου. Η Σύναξις τών άρχιστρατήγων Μιχαήλ καί Γαβριήλ καί τών λοιπών

Άσωμάτων Δυνάμεων. Μαζί τους είναι κι ό Ραφαήλ ό Αρχάγγελος. Τό όνομα τού Άρχαγγέλου Μιχαήλ δηλώνει τήν παντοκρατορική δύναμι τού Θεού (τίς ώς ό Θεός ήμών).

Ο Γαβριήλ μέ τό όνομά του σημαίνει (ήρωας τού Θεού). Καί Ραφαήλ δηλώνει ότι ό Θεός ίάται΄ (θεραπεύει) πάντας. Ίδιαίτερα ό Άρχάγγελος Ραφαήλ φανερώνει στόν Τωβίτ, (πρόσωπο τής παλαιάς διαθήκης) ότι είναι ένας άπό τούς έπτά άγγέλους πού μεταφέρουν τίς προσευχές τών άνθρώπων στόν θρόνο τού Θεού.



Καί όσοι άπό αύτούς στάθηκαν άσάλευτοι πλάϊ στόν Άρχάγγελο πού έδήλωσε άνεπιφύλακτα τήν ύπακοή του στό θείο μεγαλείο, έστερεώθηκαν στήν άγιότητα. Καί τήν μακαριότητα τού ούρανίου Βασιλέως Θεού..ένώ οί άλλοι.. έγιναν διαβόλοι.

Όμως στήν γιορτή τής μνήμης τους άς μή μιλάμε γιά σκοτάδια καί γιά πτώσεις. Στό χέρι μας είναι νά πάρωμε θέσι στά δεξιά τού Άγίου Θεού, καί ποτέ, ποτέ, άπεναντί Του.

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## Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men

ow do we acquire the "peace of God"? In order to acquire this peace, we do not set out to seek it. Rather, we must seek Christ in all things. The "peace of God" is the fruit of our relationship with Him. It is a consequence of living in fellowship with God. The more that we grow in our relationship with the Lord, the greater will be the "peace of God" in our life. This occurs naturally as we deepen the bond between Christ and ourselves, through the gracious activity of the Holy Spirit.

We should remember also that the Lord tells us that the peace which He gives to us is "not of this world." The peace which the Lord offers to us is not simply the momentary feeling of contentment. Such a feeling is emotional in nature and is generally conditioned by the immediate circumstances in which we find ourselves. The peace which the Lord offers us is an inner experience and

realization that we belong to God and that we are living in fellowship with Him.

This is the "peace of God" which can characterize our lives even when we find ourselves surrounded by turmoil and confronted with difficulties. It is an inner state of well-being which is present even in the face of disappointment, sickness, sorrow or troubles.
