

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In the memorable words of Yogi Berra, "It's like déjà vu all over again." Of the many emotions and personal feelings I experienced at the Ground Blessing Service for Saint Nicholas Church at Ground Zero on October 18, déjà vu was one of them. Defined

as "the feeling that you have already experienced something that is actually happening for the first time," I knew it wasn't possible to have actually experienced what was going on that day before, because in the history of the country and of the Church in America, it was a singularly momentous day: the establishment of an Orthodox Christian Church in the heart of one of the most famous cities in the world that would become a National Shrine overlooking one of the most visited destinations in the world. Those are a lot of firsts!

There was good cause, however, for the feelings of having been there before. First, on my 18th birthday, my family took me to New York and we enjoyed brunch at the famous, Windows on the World" restaurant on the 107th floor of North Tower of the World Trade Center. It was heralded as "The Most Spectacular Restaurant in the World" for many reasons, but especially for the views. 37 years later, it was no wonder I felt like I had been there before, as the reception following the Ground Blessing Service was held on the 68th floor of the Freedom Tower, the new World Trade Center skyscraper. Architecturally suspended so high above the same space only yards from where we enjoyed that meal many years ago truly amazed me.

Second, being at a "Ground Blessing Service" also gave me powerful memories of the October 19, 2008, Ground Blessing Service at the site of our new Holy Trinity Church, which was at the time an empty lot. As I stood in New York surrounded by the Metropolitans of the Holy Synod of the Archdiocese, it took me back to that beautiful experience surrounded by the love of our then-archpastor, His Eminence Metropolitan Maximos, as he presided over the service that put us on our new property for the first time liturgically.

But finally, as the verses of the banner Orthodox Christian hymn, "Ti Ipermaho" ("O Champion General") began, I was transported to so many places in the life and history of the Orthodox Church that I could not keep track of them. This hymn, sung at the Services of Salutations and the Akathist Hymn during Lent, as well as at many special occasions of celebration throughout the year, is the Church's melodious and victorious proclamation of the Holy Protection of the Theotokos and Mother of God, even in the most challenging times. It reminded me of my 2007 visit to the Church of Vlahernae, where the hymn was first sung in honor of the Theotokos in 626 A.D. As one pilgrim described its historical origins, "While the Byzantine army was fighting a battle away from Constantinople, the Avars attacked the queen city. The Christians turned to the Theotokos for protection, and here for the first time the Akathist Hymn was chanted in gratitude to the Mother of God for saving the city." So as I stood during the Ground Blessing at the heart of the pre-eminent city in the United States, 5,027 miles from Constantinople and 1,388 years later, the strands of that hymn re-wove a tapestry of history which once again showed the mercy of God, the love of the Theotokos and the victory in Christ for all believers.

I encourage all our parishioners to experience those historic moments by watching the viceo online at stnicholaswtc.org, and I look forward to our first community pilgrimage to the completed church. I thank you for your prayers for safe travels and a peaceful event that day, as well as for your encouragement in everything we, your priests, do to further the work of the ministry, the growth of the Church and the development of your relationship with our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. "To him belong glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen" (1 Peter 4.11).

Androutsopoulos Prayer: Our Heavenly Father, we worship you with thankful hearts, for Thou are our God, our Creator, and giver of every good and precious gift. All that is within us today cries out to bless and magnify your Holy Name. In the midst of Thanksgiving, we do not forget our sin and shortcomings. May your great love and goodness ever lead us to repentance. We thank you that you have made us so that our hearts are restless till they find rest in You. Amen.

Prophets Procliam the Messiah's Coming

"The voice of him who crieth in the wilderness, prepare ye the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill shall be made low: and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough places plain: And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together: for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it" (Isaiah 40:3-5).

"And there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots: And the spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge, and of the fear of the Lord" (Isaiah 11:1-3).

"Behold, the days come saith the Lord that I will raise unto David, a righteous Branch, and a King shall reign and prosper, and shall execute judgment and justice in the earth" (Jeremiah 23:5).

"Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a son and shall call his name Emmanuel" (Isaiah 7:14).

"Behold I will send my messenger, and he shall prepare the way before me; and the Lord, whom ye seek shall suddenly come to his temple, even the messenger of the covenant, who ye delight in: behold, he shall come, saith the Lord of hosts" (Malachi 3:1).

"Behold I will bring forth my servant the Branch" (Zechariah 3:8).

"Behold the man whose name is The Branch: and he shall grow out of his place and he shall build the temple of the Lord" (Zechariah 6:12).

"But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth who is to be ruler of Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting" (Micah 5:2).

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, The Mighty God, The everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice from henceforth even for-ever" (Isaiah 9: 6-7).

Preparation for God's Messiah

Jesus began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing" (Luke 4:21).

It takes the entire Old Testament to tell of the preparation made for the birth of God's Messiah. The Church needs the entire Bible. It needs the Old Testament story of how God was raised up, and guided, and preserved a people so that, in the "fullness of time", he might send forth His son to be cradled in their midst. The Church needs the New Testament to preserve the story of Jesus and His teaching, and to encourage it to continue its witness of all that Jesus said and did.

The Season of Spiritual Expectation

"Behold, a king shall reign in righteousness" (Isaiah 32:1). To be a season of spiritual expectations, Advent (Nativity Fast) requires preparation. During the centuries when Israel was expecting a king, few persons looked for the kind of king God finally sent to them—a king of righteousness. The King was born in a stable. He lived and walked with men where they lived. He died the death of a criminal. Though He died on a Cross, His Kingdom continued to grow. It has continued to increase as men's hearts have opened to the leading of the Holy Spirit. Jesus Christ is reigning in righteousness now. Prophecy is still being fulfilled.

Advent is a time of reflection; it is a time to recall how God emptied Himself. It is a time to straighten out what is crooked and level off any pitfalls in our human existence. The great truth that God came as a Child to accomplish our deliverance and our salvation should also be food for our reflection as we spend the days of this Holy season preparing for His Nativity. May we learn this truth of love well!

Advent—a season of expectation and preparation? Yes, but even more it is a holy time—a time of dedication or rededication – of our lives to Christ the King.

Are you and I part of His Kingdom? Have we let Him become our King so that righteousness, peace and joy may be ours?

Thoughts for the Day

Look at the Cross: it is the disclosure of God's love. It takes dedication to put our time, abilities, and possessions under divine control.

Mouse Tales: The St. Spyridon Church School Library Update | Spero




Hello to All My Precious Children and Happy Thanksgiving to everyone!

My little sister, Zoe, is always asking me many guestions and sometimes they are tough to answer! (She thinks just because I am the "Big Cheese" I know everything!) Well, I, Spero, am happy to tell you, my precious children, about a series of books by Joel Anderson that uses simple stories and pictures to talk about big subjects. The series is called, "Big Topics for Little Kids."

"Tell Me About Love," is one of the books in this series. It tells us that love is the greatest gift we can give anyone. You know, there are many kinds of love. The love of a friend is different than the way you love Mommy and Daddy or brother and sister. Our Heavenly Father's love is the most perfect love. In fact, Yiayia tells us that the Bible says, "God is love" (1 John 4.16) and that God loved us so much He sent His only-begotten Son to save us (John 3.16). This is how we know real love: that Jesus gave His life for us. So today, try to show someone you love them with a hug, some kind words, a good deed or even a small gift. It is a small way of sharing the love that our Heavenly Father has given us.

"Tell Me About Faith" is a story about a little girl named Faith, whose father is a soldier. She knows him only through his letters, but she trusts in his promises and believes in his love. This story will help my little ones understand the meaning of hope and trust. You know, one summer when I went to camp, the children learned about trust through fun exercise. They stood in front of another camper and closed their eyes and fell into the arms of the other camper. Why did they do this? Because they were putting their trust in someone who could see for them. That is how it is



with our Heavenly Father. He sees and knows everything. He gives us commandments to help us through life



without stumbling along the road. But it takes faith to do what is right, not doing what others want you to do. It takes trust to follow His words.

The final book in this series I want to chat about is "Eternity." It shows us how life continues forever by talking about two births: the birth of a baby, which begins life on earth, and the eternal birth of an old man, as he enters his new home in heaven, which is for us life everlasting. We know God has no beginning or end. But each of us have a beginning when we were born on earth. Yiayia tells us little ones that Jesus said if we believe in Him and follow His Father's commandments, He will go ahead of us and prepare a place for each of us in Heaven, where we can be with Him for all eternity.

Boy, I am really looking forward to Heaven, because it will last forever and ever! (But I have to be patient, because the only way in is when Jesus opens the door for us!)



ία σειρά Αγίων κοσμούν μέ τήν άγιαστική, χαριτό βρυτη παρουσία τους τά Επτάνησα καί δίνουν δύναμη στόν τόπο καί τούς κατοίκους. Ακρίτες φύλακες τής Ορθοδοξίας στά σύνορα Ανατολής καί Δύσης.

Κέρκυρα

Ο Αγιος Σπυρίδων, είναι ό πολιούχος καί προστάτης τής Κέρκυρας, ό θαυματουργός Αγιος,

πού έσωσε πολλές φορές τό νησί μέ τά θαύματά του άπό άρρώστιες καί καταστροφές καί στόν όποίο προστρέχουν χιλιάδες πιστοί μέχρι καί σήμερα, άναζητώντας παρηγοριά καί βοήθεια. Ως Επίσκοπος Τριμυθούντος τής Κύπρου πήρε μέρος στήν Α΄Οίκουμενική Σύνοδο τής Νίκαιας τό 325 μ.Χ. Τό σκήνωμά του άφθαρτο μεταφέρθηκε στήν Κέρκυρα τό 1456. Εορτάζεται στό νησί έκτός άπό τίς 12 Δεκεμβρίου καί άλλες 4 φορές μέσα στό χρόνο. Συμπολιούχος είναι καί ή 'Αγία Θεοδώρα, πού άναστήλωσε τίς είκόνες καί κατέπαυσε έτσι ή μεγάλη θρησκευτική έριδα τής Είκονομαχίας. Τό σκήνωμά της βρίσκεται άφθαρτο στό μητροπολιτικό ναό τού νησιού. Τό σημαντικότερο βυζαντινό μνημείο τού νησιού είναι ό ναός - όπου καί ό τάφος -, τών άγίων Ιάσονα καί Σωσιπάτρου, μαθητών τού άποστόλου Παύλου, πού δίδαξαν τόν χριστιανισμό στήν Κέρκυρα.

Παξοί - Αντίπαξοι

Στούς Παξούς τιμάται ό άγιος Γάιος, ένας άπό τούς έβδομήκοντα πού άσχολήθηκαν μέ τή μετάφραση τής Παλαιάς Διαθήκης. Σύμφωνα μέ τήν παράδοση, ό Αγιος σέ ταξίδι του πρός τή Ρώμη άσθένησε καί σταμάτησε στό νησί. Εδω κοιμήθκε καί έτάφη μέ τιμές. Πάνω στόν τάφο τού Αγίου είναι χτισμένος ό ναός ό άφιερωμένος στή μνήμη του.

Λευκάδα

Τό μοναστήρι τής Παναγίας τής Φανερωμένης, πολιούχου καί προστάτιδας τής Λευκάδας, σημείο άναφοράς τών άπανταχού Λευκαδίων, βρίσκεται σέ ένα ύψωμα πάνω άπό τήν πόλη. Πανηγυρίζει μέ κάθε μεγαλοπρέπεια τή Δευτέρα τού Αγίου Πνεύματος, μέ πλήθη προσκυνητών νά συρρέουν άπό όλες τίς γύρω περιοχές. 'Ωστόσο ή Αγία Μεγαλομάρτυς Μαύρα άπό τόν 140 αί. μ.Χ. (1331) θεωρείται καί τιμάται ώς πολιούχος τής πόλης τής Λευκάδας. Σήμερα, ένα μικρό έκκλησάκι πρός τιμήν τής Αγίας καί τού συζύγου της, Αγίου Τιμοθέου, ύπάρχει στή θέση παλιού προμαχώνα τού Φρουρίου.

Ιθάκη

Τό ξακουστό άπό τήν άρχαιότητα γραφικό νησί τής Ιθάκης προσφέρει πλούσια τούς πνευματικούς του θησαυρούς καί στούς φιλάγιους έπισκέπτες καί προσκυνητές, άφού προστατεύεται άπό τίς πρεσβείες τής πολιούχου Παναγίας Καθαριώτισσας. Τό όμώνυμο ίστορικό μοναστήρι κοσμείται άπό άγιασμένες πνευματικές μορφές, πού λαμπρύνουν τήν Ορθόδοξη Εκκλησία μέ τή φιλόθεη βιοτή καί τήν άγιαστική τους χάρη, όπως ό έξ Ιθάκης νεοφανής καί θαυματουργός ίερομάρτυς Αγιος Ραφαήλ, πού μαρτύρησε στή Μυτιλήνη στίς 9 Απριλίου 1463 καί ό Οσιος Ιωακείμ ό Παπουλάκης, πού έκοιμήθη στίς 2 Μαρτίου 1868 στό ίστορικό νησί τής Ιθακης.

Κεφαλλονιά

Η παρουσία τού ίερού Σκηνώματος τού Αγίου Γερασίμου στό νησί τής Κεφαλλονιάς, είναι έκδηλη στήν όμώνυμη Ιερά Μονή. Αφθαρτο καί άναλλοίωτο εύωδιάζει έδώ καί τετρακόσια χρόνια. Ενα άπό τά πιό εύωδιαστά άνθη τής Κεφαλλονιάς είναι καί ό νεοφανής Οσιος Πατήρ Παναγής Μπασιάς. Ο άπόηχος τής ζωής του, τών θαυμάτων του καί τού προφητικού του χαρίσματος φτάνει μέχρι τίς ήμέρς μας. Στίς 21 Μαίου 1864 γεύεται τή χαρά τής Ενώσεως τής Επτανήσου μέ τή Μητέρα Ελλάδα, γιά τήν όποία έργάστηκε μέ τό δικό του τρόπο, διατηρώντας καί καλλιεργώντας τήν Ορθόδοξη παράδοση σέ τόσο δύσκολες πολιτικές καί κοινωνικές περιόδους. Ελεήμων, πατρικός καί στοργικός άγκάλιασε μέ τήν άγάπη του καί τίς συμβουλές του όλάκερο τό νησί.

Ζάκυνθος

Προστάτης άγιος τής Ζακύνθου είναι ό Αγιος Διονυσιος. Οί κάτοικοι τιμούν τή χάρη του δύο φορές τό χρόνο μέ λιτανείες τού ίερου λειψάνου του σέ ίδιαίτερα κατανυκτική άτμόσφαιρα. Εγινε γνωστός ώς Αγιος τής Συγγνώμς, γιατί συγχώρεσε τό φονιά τού άδερφού του. Τό Σεπτό Σκήνωμά τού άφθαρτο καί μυροβόλο άποτελεί μέχρι σήμερα πόλο έλξης χιλιάδων προσκυνητών καί πηγή συνεχών ίάσεων καί θαυμάτων. Στίς 24 Ιουλίου οί Ζακυνθινοί έορτάζουν τόν Αγιο Θεόφιλο τό Νεομάρτυρα, τόν ποπολάρο (=άνθρωπο τού λαού). Στόν ίερό ναό τού Παντοκράτορος Γαίτανίου Ζακύνθου βρίσκεται τό λείψανο τού Αγίου Ιωσήφ, τού έκ Κρήτης Ήγιασμένου. Στό διάβα τών αίώνων τήν έπιβλητική ήρεμία καί όμορφιά τών νήσων Στροφάδων καί τού περιώνυμου έκεί Μοναστηριού έρχονται νά ταράξουν οί άνελέητες έπιδρομές ληστοπειρατών. Μία άπό τίς χειρότερες συνέβη τό 1537. Οί Πατέρες τής Μονής σφαγιάσθηκαν. Η μνήμη τους τιμάται κάθε χρόνο στίς 29 Σεπτεμβρίου.

Κύθηρα

Η Ιερά Μονή Μυρτιδίων είναι ή έδρα τού σπουδαιότερου κειμηλίου γιά τήν Κυθηραίκή Παράδοση καί κληρονομιά. Η είκόνα τής Παναγίας τής Μυρτιδιώτισσας, προστάτιδας τού νησιού, είναι τό σύμβολο τής όρθόδοξης πίστης χιλιάδων Κυθηρίων άπό τότε πού βρέθηκε. Τό νησί έχει καί τούς δικούς του πολιούχους - τόν Οσιο Θεόδωρο καί τήν Αγία Ελέσσα. Στά βορειοανατολικά δεσπόζει τό μοναστήρι τής Αγιας Μόνης, άφιερωμένο στήν Παναγία.

Η παρουσία τόσων άγίων καί (ερών λειψάνων στά Επτάνησα, έναν άπό τούς δημοφιλέστερους όρθόδοξους προσκυνηματικούς προορισμούς, βεβαιώνει κάθε όρθόδοξη έλληνική ψυχή πώς οί Αγιοι κρατούν τούτο τόν τόπο μέ τή χάρη καί τίς πρεσβείες τους, τείχος Ορθοδοξίας έναντίον τού Παπισμού. Επτανήσιοι καί μή, άς τούς έπικαλούμαστε.

Ask the Elders | Parents' Responsibility for Raising Their Children

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred to as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many books have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to be blessed by their words.

Question: Geronda, how can parents entrust their young children to God?

od gave the first-created humans, Adam and Eve, the great blessing to become His co-creators. From then on, the parents, the grandparents, and so forth, are also God's co-creators, because they create the body of the child. In a way, God is obligated to care for the chil-

dren. When a child is baptised, God sends an Angel for the child's protection. So then, the child is protected by God, by the Guardian Angel and by the parents. The Guardian Angel is always by the child, helping. The more a child grows and matures, the more the parents are relieved of their duties and responsibilities. Should the parents die, God—both from on high and from close by—and also the Guardian Angel, from close by, continue—always—to protect the child.

Parents have to help their children spiritually when they are little, because then, even their faults are little and they can easily be corrected. It's like a fresh potato; if you scratch it a little, it's peeled. If, however, it gets older and staler, you will need a sharp knife to clean it; and if it has some dark spots, you'll need to dig deeper. If the children are filled with Christ from an early age, they will always remain close to Him. And even if they should stray a little when they grow up, either because of a phase of rebellion they're going through or because of bad influences, they are sure to return to their senses. This is because the fear of God and the devotion that watered their hearts when they were young cannot ever be eradicated.

Later, during adolescence—until they have gotten their children educated and settled—the struggle of the parents will become greater. Parents should do all they can to help them at this age and leave all that is beyond their power in the hands of Almighty God. When parents entrust their children to God, then God is obligated to help on matters which are not humanly possible. If, for example, the children are disobedient, the parents should entrust them to God and not try to pressure them in any way. The mother should say in prayer, "My Lord, my children won't listen to me. I can't do anything to help them. Please, take care of them."

Question: Does the responsibility for raising children lie exclusively with the parents?

arents Parents are the ones who are primarily responsible, because—depending on the kind of upbringing which they will give their children—some will grow up to be good priests, others good teachers and so forth; and they will in turn help their own children and those of other people. If the parents pray and lead a spiritual life during the time the child is still in the mother's womb, the child will be born sanctified. And in turn, if they continue to help the child spiritually, that child will become a blessed and sanctified person who will help others in society, either through service in the Church or through public work. We all have to help the children so that they can become good people, and so that a little good yeast will remain intact for the generations to come. Because now, the way things are going, even the yeast will be lost. And if the yeast is lost, then what will happen?

Those parents who have been delivered of children, having given them their bodies, must also contribute—as best they can—to their spiritual rebirth. Also, that which parents cannot do themselves for their children should be entrusted to teachers. This is why our Church, in Her prayers, refers to "our parents and our teachers." There are also the spiritual fathers who, although they may not have children of their own, can assist in a positive way with the upbringing of children since it is they who labour for the children's spiritual regeneration.

What I'm trying to say is that everyone should help the children, each person in his or her own way, with their good example, so that the children may be regenerated, live peacefully in this life and ultimately go to Paradise. When children become spiritual human beings, then they really don't need any rules or prohibitions. "The law is not made for a righteous man, but for the lawless and disobedient..." Laws are needed to limit and control the lawless. Spiritual authority is superior to any human authority.

Question: Geronda, when their child disobeys and rebels, how should the parents act?

or a child to be disobedient and to behave badly, something's wrong. It could be that he witnesses unpleasant scenes or hears quarrels either in or out of the house. In any case, in spiritual matters, children are helped chiefly by the example we set, not by force.

A lot of parents fight in front of the children and set a bad example. The poor children are confused and saddened. Then the parents, in order to comfort them fulfil all their demands. When children see their parents have love and respect for one another, behaving with prudence, praying, and so on, then these positive images are imprinted on their soul. This is why I say that the best inheritance the parents can bestow upon their children is their own spiritual devotion.

A child needs a lot of love and affection, and much guidance. A child needs you to sit by his side, listen to his problems, caress him and kiss him If a mother takes an upset and mischievous child into her arms to caress and kiss, the child will calm down. If the young child is filled with affection and love, later that child will be strong and able to face the problems of life.
