## What is impossible with men is possible with God." (Luke 18.27)

elcome to an unusual and historic issue of *The Herald*. It is unusual because it is not *yet* filled with news of many upcoming events and photos of the active life of the Holy Trinity community as usual because of the on-going COVID limitations. As your priest I offer my sincere thanks for your patience, endurance, cooperation and dedication during the past 11 months. Yes, it's hard to believe, but the restrictions and safety precautions we are hopefully working our way out of soon started nearly a year ago on March 13, 2020.

If someone had said to us all back then, "You will need to keep various COVID-response measures in place for the next 11 months, we would have probably responded, "Impossible!" Yet here we are. If we also would have been told, "Most of your community life activities will be curtailed, and even the capacity of your worship services will be restricted, but don't worry, you will still be able to sustain the financial health of the community," we would also probably have said, "Impossible!"

But the biggest "Impossible!" of all would probably have been the unlikely prediction that even in the midst of the worst economic shutdown and financial crisis many of us have ever seen, the Capital Campaign would—8 years ahead of time!—pay off our mortgage and draw to a close. To that we would almost certainly have all said, "Impossible!"

But, glory to God, as the Lord Himself said, "What is impossible with men is possible with God." Thanks to the sacrificial love of the people of this community for Christ and His Church, what started out as a plan, a hope and a prayer in 2008, to "Raise Up the Foundations of Many Generations" (Isaiah 58.12), has indeed come to pass. In doing so we have written the next chapter of the Holy Trinity story started by generations before us on the North Side who established the community and set the example to follow: love the Lord and serve your Church with all your heart.

Neither the brief comments here nor the larger list of Capital Campaign pledges and donors found in the pages of this issue can fully encompass the many ways the Lord motivated, equipped, inspired and blessed everyone who participated in so many acts of faith and love. It is impossible for us to know them all. But the Lord knows each precious offering. So please allow me to simply end with this blessing from the Divine Liturgy of Saint Basil. It is a eucharistic prayer which applies quite well here as a prayer of thanks for all who have offered and for everything they have done:

Remember, Lord, those who have brought You these gifts, and for whom and through whom and the intentions for which they were offered. Remember, Lord, those who bear fruit and do good works in Your holy churches, and those who remember the poor. Reward them with Your rich and heavenly gifts. Grant them in return for earthly things, heavenly gifts; for temporal, eternal; for corruptible, incorruptible....Remember, Lord our God, all Your people, and pour out Your rich mercy upon them, granting them their petitions for salvation.

#### 5- Monuments, Stones and Markers:

Vertical or flat stone or metal maker costs are to be arranged between the family and the Monument Company of your choice. Additional costs are incurred for the monument foundation. Costs vary with the type and size of the monument. These can only be established after the purchase of the monument. Size of monuments is dictated by the Cemetery Rules and Regulations and the Cemetery Chairmen must be contacted prior to installation of any monuments.

#### 6- Monuments, Stones and Markers Foundation

Repair:	Time (\$50/per hour) & Material
New single width stone foundation 36"	\$300
New double width stone foundation 72"	\$400

#### Notes:

- (1) Right of Burial in a grave can be purchased by lump sum payment (preferred) or by installment payments. Installment payments are to be completed within one calendar year.
- (2) Costs include a one-time application of topsoil and seed after ground has settled. Subsequent addition of topsoil and seed is the responsibility of the family.
- (3) Some additional fees would be incurred for transportation, if opening/closing fees are required for another gravesite or legal/court fees are required.
- (4) Holidays include: Christmas, New Years Day, Good Friday, Easter, Memorial Day, 4th of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Veterans Day. Orthodox burials will not be permitted on some of these and other days due to the cannons of the Church. See your priest for clarifications.

# HOW TO DEAL WITH ENVY

# He who buries his own gifts of God's grace, envies the gifts of others.

### Geronda, how can an envious person be helped to overcome his jealousness?

If he becomes aware of the gifts with which God has endowed him and fully utilises them, then he will stop being envious and his life will be Paradise. Many people take no account of their own gifts; they see only the gifts of others and are overcome by envy. They view themselves as having been wronged, as lesser, and end up tormenting themselves, making their lives miserable. They say to themselves, "Why should he have those gifts and not I?" But, you see, he has his own gifts, and you have others. Do you remember Cain and Abel? Cain did not seek out his own gifts, but looked upon the gifts of Abel, which is how he cultivated malicious envy toward his brother; then he turned against God, and from envy, went on to murder. Yet, he might have had more and greater blessings than Abel.

### Geronda, how can one, seeing the gifts of others, not be envious but rejoice?

One can rejoice over the gifts of others if he utilises his own gifts instead of burying them. For years now at this monastery, I have been watching a very devoted sister who, in spite of having a lovely voice, does not want to chant. Since she buries her own gift and refuses to chant, she gets distressed when she hears the chanting of the other Sister, whose voice is


not very good. You see, she does not realise that although God has given her a better voice, she does not cultivate it. This is why I say that each person should look to see if they actually have within themselves the very same blessing they envy in someone else, or that perhaps God has given them a different one. You see, God is not unjust to anyone; He has given each person a unique gift which will help him with his spiritual progress.

Each person should find the gift that God has given him and praise the benevolent God—not with pride or hypocrisy, but with humility—by recognising that he has not measured up to God's blessings and should do so in the future.

### Geronda, I am envious of some sisters because they have certain gifts which I do not have.

We should not be ungrateful to God our Good Father, Who has endowed all His creatures with various gifts, because He knows what each one of us needs so that we will not be harmed. But we often act like little children who complain because the Father has not given us a dollar or two, as he has to our siblings, when in fact he has given us an hundred. We imagine that what was given to us is nothing because we take it to be only paper, while the metal coins given to our siblings seem more attractive, and so we cry and are indignant with our Good Father.

Geronda, I am envious of a Sister be-

### cause I see that she has humility, simplicity and devotion.

I will pray that she die. Do you want her to die?

No, Geronda! By no means do I want anything bad to happen to her. I don't wish that the other person has no virtues. I only wish that I, too, could have some.

Well then, let's split the virtues in two so you can each have half! Don't worry. You have the good kind of envy; you "covet earnestly the best gifts."

#### Is there such a thing as good envy?

Yes, when one is envious for the good the others have and at the same time rejoices in their progress, then such envy is good. However, if one is upset when he sees someone else progressing, or if one is secretly pleased by another's hardship, then that kind of envy is bad. When a person gets to the point of rejoicing over the progress of others, then Christ will grant him all the progress of the others so that he will rejoice as much as all of them, and then, naturally, both his progress and his joy will be immense. ••

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


#### WHY WE SHOULD READ THE BIBLE
