I say that with a full appreciation of the wonderful, amazing and truly renewing and refreshing experiences both Presvytera Becky and I had on sabbatical. We fully embraced the opportunity to be away, go on adventures and take to heart the great blessings the Lord had in store for us. But it's still good to be home!

Serving Divine Liturgy and seeing the beautiful familiar faces of Holy Trinity on our first Sunday back reminded us both that there are many special places and many wonderful churches in the world, but Holy Trinity Church is truly home.

Having said that, to answer the question "How was the sabbatical?" in just a few words or by sharing a few pictures would not possibly be able to capture it all. But there are some highlights I can offer to give you just a glimpse.

Though I had no official ecclesiastical responsibilities during our time away, remember that Saint Paul says of the priesthood in Christ in his Epistle to the Hebrews, "You are a priest forever" (7.17), so it was my great joy and blessing to be able to serve 13 Liturgies in 13 different churches and monasteries during our travels. And what a wonderful way that was to experience the faith of those communities while also sharing with them our experience of Orthodoxy in America. It reaffirmed the oneness of the Orthodox Church in many ways.

Please also know that in addition to serving as a priest for those services, Presvytera Becky and I were also fully committed to enjoying our time away as a couple celebrating 33 years of married life together. We visited my home village of Akrata (Peloponissos) and my family there, and one of the liturgies I served was at the church where my Yiayia was baptized. We also visited Presvytera's home village of Teriahi (Epirus), where we found the house in which her father was born and the church in which he was baptized. And we were able to celebrate our 33rd wedding anniversary on Mykonos, where we spent part of our honeymoon! We also made it to 10 other islands, so relaxing was no problem!

In the last issue of the Herald before departing, I wrote this about clergy sabbaticals: "We require a time to receive rather than give, to get input rather than give output, to carefully nurture and cultivate our lives." I can affirm to you all that I was faithful to that goal and to the graciousness and generosity with which this parish supported it. Both Presvytera Becky and I are forever grateful for that opportunity and for your love. You are in our hearts and prayers always!

I am also thankful beyond words to Father Radu, our Office Administrator Mary Portellos, our Parish Council, the Chanters, Choir, ministries and ministry leaders who continued the dynamic and faithful life of this parish going in my absence. ### Church School Has Resumed

With God's blessing and praying for His divine protection on all our students, staff and families, Holy Trinity Church has resumed Church School classes in-person for the 2021-2022 year. Please note the following important matters:

- **Remember: "Church School" starts with "Church!"** All families are asked to attend Divine Liturgy each Sunday, starting at 9:30. The Youth Sermon, a special feature of our Sunday Liturgy at Holy Trinity Church, is offered following the Gospel, so be sure to arrive on time for a message created for the students.
- **Liturgy Dismissal:** All students and staff will remain in church through Holy Communion then proceed to classes.
- **Safety:** As per Metropolis guidelines at the current time, all students, teachers, and staff are required to wear masks while in the classroom. Please have a mask for your student so that he/she may wear it while in class. (This is optional for Divine Liturgy and Coffee Hour)
- **Class Dismissal and Snacks:** Please assist us in offering our children the time to fully participate in their lessons each Sunday by allowing them to remain in class until the end of the session. **IMPORTANT: ALL CLASSES CONCLUDE AT 11:30am.** Parents of Pre-School students may pick up their children on the upper level Education Center by using the Education Center stairs in the Gallery near the Bookstore. Parents of all other students are asked to wait for their children downstairs in the Gallery or Grand Room during Coffee Hour. Church School snacks are now located in the

first floor hall outside the Fireside Room. Thank you for your cooperation and support.




## OUTREACH MINISTRIES

# Stewardship: Rising to the Occasion

In late August, my husband Marc and I planned a whirlwind trip to Greece after canceling our trip scheduled for the year prior. We had an entire itinerary mapped out, hopping from island to island, and one part of our plans that we were most looking forward to was traveling to Aegina. We specifically wanted to go to Aegina to visit the monastery (pictured above) of Agios Nektarios, a saint who occupies a very special place in both of our hearts. I had been twice before, once as a camper and once as staff with Ionian Village, and I kept telling Marc how incredible his first time visiting was going to be.

You can imagine our disappointment when our taxi driver told us that the monastery had closed its doors two days prior—while we were literally crossing the Atlantic—due to a COVID-19 outbreak among the nuns. Its reopening was undetermined, and we knew this meant we would be back in Pittsburgh before the monastery would welcome visitors again.

Frustrated, but determined not to let that set the tone for the rest of our trip, we made the most of our first day in Aegina, spending the sunset walking around the port and eventually meandering over to a tiny little

church nestled among the boats: The Church of St. Nikolas of the Sea. We walked in, made our donation, and lit candles, spending time appreciating the beauty in the small church and saying our prayers. While a much different experience than what we imagined our time at Agios Nektarios would have been, Marc and I both agreed that it was the perfect way to end our first day in Greece. If our carefully laid out plans had not been upended by an unforeseen event, would we actually have taken the time to step into St. Nikolas?

Once we arrived back home from our trip and dove back into our regular work routines, a former coworker reached out to me and asked if our church was putting on our regular food festival this year. I explained that our festival was modified for a drive-thru only version. As I broke the news that we also were operating with a limited menu, I could tell that she did not sound quite as excited as she originally had. To be perfectly honest, I was not exactly sure what to expect for our festival. I was so used to craziness and insanity in the gyro tent, somehow surviving a dinner rush when the JOY and GOYA kids left to do their dance performances, and tossing my grease-covered shoes in the trash, that I was having trouble envisioning how everything would go. Festival weekend came and went, and to be perfectly honest once again, I loved it. My fellow volunteers and I had fun while filling orders in the tent, and my shoes survived to see another day. When I turned on my work com-

puter to start the work week, I saw an email from her at the top of my inbox. She wrote how much she and all of her family loved their food from the festival, how efficient the drive-thru process was, and how happy she was to once again return to Holy Trinity for delicious Greek food. She was extremely gracious in her praise for all of our volunteers, from the greeters at the front of the line to the runners who dropped off her order to her car window. While not our “traditional” Greek food festival, she still was able to experience Greek culture for the day - and enjoy our ridiculously delicious chocolate baklava!

Now, what do a small harbor church in Greece and a Pittsburgher thankful for baklava have to do with each other?



# Holy Trinity Completion & Consecration Update

Plans for the “Completion and Consecration” of Holy Trinity Church by the end of 2023 were approved by the General Assembly last November. They provide for completing all the items required for consecration including completing the remaining iconography in the Church and Narthex; installation of numerous items of handcrafted ecclesiastical wood furnishings and seating; and other liturgically required items for the Consecration.

The approved plan to raise the needed monies for the project over the next 3 years comprises a combination of funds from the Greek Festival and catering income, as well as parishioner donations, and all **without incurring loans or bank financing**, so we will remain **debt-free** having now paid off the mortgage.

## HOLY TRINITY CHURCH'S 2021 TASTE OF GREECE DRIVE-THROUGH FESTIVAL

Early this year, the Holy Trinity community faced a great challenge: commit to a full in-person Festival as usual and start the six-month food preparation process, or instead plan for a drive-through only event. Given the uncertainties of the pandemic at the time, it was determined that a drive-through event would be the best choice. But having never done such an event, many questions remained: Could we do it successfully? What changes to our current format needed to be made? Would the local community respond as enthusiastically as they always have? And will our volunteers step up to help in the current environment? What we all knew for sure was that it was a community choice that needed everyone's support ... and God's blessing!

To the glory of God, it all went tremendously well. Our Festival Committee did a fantastic job of re-imagining the event as a drive-through. Our parishioners came through with their traditional volunteer enthusiasm. And the local community responded in great numbers. Many of them expressed their thanks for a well-done event and their appreciation for us putting it together. Once social media review offered this: "For this church's Greek food festival, I ordered the entire menu of food. # Greek Dance Returns!

## The Holy Trinity Greek Dancers offer a summer performance for the community on the Feast of the Falling Asleep of the Theotokos

**T**he Holy Trinity Greek Dancers have an honored role in the life and heritage of Holy Trinity Church and have been a regular feature of the Festival for decades. With COVID uncertainties causing the Festival to be a drive-through only event this year, our Greek Dance instructors Victoria Andromalos-Dale and Eleni Dedousis committed to still finding a way for the dancers to practice and perform. Here, Eleni answers some questions about what it took and how it was done.

**Q: How did the idea of putting together a Greek dance performance come about?**

**A:** Victoria and I spoke and decided we really wanted to have a performance at our church festival, since we knew it was going on this year. Once we learned that the festival was going to be a drive thru, we still wanted to perform and allow the kids to get together and learn the dances, so we decided to do a performance after church one Sunday before the festival.

**Question 2: What kind of preparation went into the event?**

We practiced weekly from May, and then the closer we got to the performance, the more practices we had. In July we started getting costumes out and ready by ironing and sizing them with all who were dancing, which was challenging to get a final count.

**Question 3: How did the young people and their parents respond ?**

I think that most parents and children were really happy and excited to get

an opportunity to get back to dancing. I know I was excited for the kids to be able to see their friends that they have made over the years at dance and be able to learn new things with them.

**Q: What challenges did you encounter, especially with COVID concerns?**

A: The challenges were getting children and parents to attend. I believe that some parents were worried about the closeness that is required in order to dance. We tried to practice outside as often as the weather allo-

wed and made sure to have hand sanitizer available for anyone who wanted it, as well as having some children wear masks, if their parents wanted to them to wear them.

**Q: How did the event go? How did the community respond?**

A: I think that the event went great. We had family members attend church in order to watch the performance, and many members of the community stayed after as well to watch the kids dance. The kids were very happy to do the dances and i think the com-

munity was happy to watch the kids doing something that they all love. I just hope the parents were able to see how well it went and how safe it was, and how comfortable the children felt.

I hope all our children will return to dance next year. There is also a dance festival coming up next October that we would really like to perform at and attend so its important for Victoria and I that we get as many young people dancing as possible, so we can put on a great performance. ❖

# Give Yourself to God

## Confronting anxiety and finding God's peace in today's world

### Geronda, could you speak to us about anxiety?

**W**hen God is present in the soul, when He lives inside the soul, there is no room for the devil; he has no place there. When the light of God is present in the soul, when God is present as light, there is no room for darkness. Even if we want to put darkness in the soul, it stands no chance because spiritual darkness is the absence of the light of God.

The situation is the same with anxiety, Anxiety is non-existent. People create anxiety for themselves, as they do with so many things. We must be careful of this. People create their problems by having the wrong attitude before God. Generally speaking, a person could have a mistaken perspective of themselves, of others, of reality, and truth, But it is specifically when a person has the wrong attitude before God, that they create thousands of issues for themselves.

### How can I not be affected by so many problems that bombard me?

Do not say, 'What can we do since others create problems for us?' I can positively assure you that even if others harm us, we cannot be affected if we do not give in to these things, allowing ourselves to be harmed. Everything serves man, everything works for our benefit, even the worst


of things. It is because we, as human beings, do not approach and face things correctly that we allow these things to harm us, traumatize us, weigh us down, pressure us, and to create anxieties.

Many times, the way in which you react when you worry, have some pain, or are wounded, looks like this: Someone stabs you and you take the knife and begin to twist it inside the wound. Remove the knife and look at how you are going to heal your wound. But no, you do not remove the knife. Instead, you hold it there and even if someone wants to remove it you do not let them. And as if that is not enough, you even twist it inside the wound.

This should not seem strange to you. What do you think? When someone, for example, says something hurtful that traumatizes and wounds you, you think of it constantly, have it constantly in your mind, and do not want to forget it, right? And if that is not enough, you become angry with the person who said this, you do wrong and hate them, and you want to take revenge! In reality, all of these things mean this: You turn the knife that wounded you.

### How can I find peace when I am hurt by others?

The great evil in life is not that which happens to us. The great evil, no matter what happens to us, is if we do not

confront things correctly. If we face a situation as people of God, as something within the providence of God, as something that God knows, something God controls and allows for our benefit; if we face it with our spiritual understanding, as something that will benefit us, then it cannot harm us at all and there is no anxiety.

Why is it that a small child does not get anxious? It is not simply that its logic and mind have not matured, but that it trusts its father and mother. Even if the entire world fell apart, that child would be carefree.

### Geronda, it is so hard for me to trust God when I am so anxious!

It is not impossible. It can happen. Just as the small child trusts its father, all of us, no matter the problems or difficulties we might have, can trust in God. But our trust in Him is even stronger than the child toward the parent because we are under the shelter of God's wings. He protects everyone even more than parents take care of their child. Though the child feels carefree in its parents' embrace, the person who has the certainty that God is in control will feel even more carefree. ❖

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
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## THE SACREDNESS OF GOD'S HANDIWORK

**H**ow do we live in creation? Do we relate to it as a place full of “things” we can use for whatever need we want to fulfill and whatever goal we wish to accomplish? Or do we see creation first of all as a sacramental reality, a sacred space where God reveals to us the immense beauty of the Divine? As long as we only use creation, we cannot recognize its sacredness because we are approaching it as if we were its owners. But when we relate to all that surrounds us as created by the same God who created us and as the place where God appears to us and calls us to worship and adoration, then we are able to recognize the sacredness of all God's handiwork.
