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

Hebrews 10.36

My beloved Holy Trinity family,

One of the things that greatly impressed me during my sabbatical travels throughout Greece was the incredible endurance the Christians there have had throughout history. We visited monasteries that had been rebuilt after raids, fires and even complete massacres. We prayed in churches that had been built over time by the dedication and perservance of many generations. We also visited numerous exhibits celebrating the 200th anniversary of the Greek revolution and freedom from the centuries of opression of the Ottoman Turkish yoke.

In all those cases, endurance was needed. And faith. And hope. As we enter the year of the Lord 2022, it is hard to believe that this will be the third year in a row our lives are being affected by the pandemic. You may remember it was back in 2020 that severe restrictions changed our worship and community life in ways we could have never imagined before. But we endured. With faith. And hope.

And here we are, entering another year, indeed by the grace of God. By now it may be tempting to have the thought of still dealing with the pandemic tire us out, wear us down or even steal our hope. Saint Paul, in his admonition to the Hebrews cited above, is not letting us get away with that. "You have need of endurance," he says.

So as we press forward into 2022, let us indeed endure. Endure what? Whatever is before us, knowing that "in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to his purpose" (Romans 8.28). The "those who love Him" part is referring to us, and that places us squarely and surely in the path of God working for our good.

As your priest I must confess I am continually inspired and overwhelmed by the love of God and His Holy Church you have, and how many ways that is made evident. The photos in this issue reflect that quite well. Your love for those in need can be seen in the dozens of Christmas gifts for needy children and in over 1,000 food items donated to the hungry. Your love for your children is witnessed through the support your offer the youth and religious education ministries of this church. Your love and respect for the elders and senior member of the community can be seen in the joy of the Christmas celebration offered to them. And—so close to the heart of a priest—your love for God Himself through your return to attendance at worship services and your re-uniting with Jesus Christ through the receiving of His Holy Body and Blood at Holy Communion is inspiring beyond words.

Sustain yourself on that love. If we think, "Oh, how long can we put up with this?" it will be impossible. But if we are encouraged, inspired and uplifted by those many ways of love, all things are possible, because love "bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. 
There will be more challenges to face this year, that is a guarantee as it re-





ASK THE ELDERS MATTHEW THE POOR

The Essence of Christian Service

The one who strives to relay the true essence of Christian service to others is in absolute need of the mystery of Christian love.

he appearance of service involves outward forms: sermons, rites, particular activities organized to serve the needs of the children, and the division of responsibilities, teaching and providing others with the necessary tools of service.

Gheronda, those are all good, but it sounds like there is more to it.

The essence of service is the transmission of eternal life to the children whom God has placed in our charge: "From that time Jesus began to preach and to say, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt. 4.17).

The transmission of eternal life involves a person's acceptance of the work Christ accomplished for his sake, which He also bequeathed to the Church for its transmission to any and every person who believes in it through the Gospel and the Holy Mysteries.

That is a high calling usually done by clergy and monastics, isn't it?

In fact, it is not difficult to accomplish the external aspect of Christian service. It may be done by anyone. However, no human being, no matter how virtuous or talented, can accomplish the essence of Christian service on his own. Service touches God's own life; therefore, it cannot be successfully accomplished by ordinary, visible means. The essence of service is a deeply mystical thing, far beyond human nature. Only if we correctly understand the inner essence of service can we avoid repeating any past mistaken attempts to accomplish it.

What do I need to be prepared to serve others in this manner?

What is needed for active faith is a pulsating life, not the natural life that is latent in the mustard seed, but eternal life, the life of God. Or, to put it another way, man must believe in God and live by Him.

This is the essence of Christian service—to tell others about the eternal life by which we live, with the hope that they might eventually experience it with us. This living faith that comprises such a vital part of the essence of service is giveing freely and generally to everyone who accepts it.

Living faith subsists on a full trust in God and never ceases to rely on His primary title and attribute—"Almighty." Faith never abandons the conviction that He will fulfill all that He has promised. Thus, the fruits of living

faith depend on this conviction and trust in God's word. If living faith (and the conviction and trust that accompany it) were ever removed from the service, then all that would remain would be the appearance of service.

Gheronda, what else can I offer in Christian service besides faith?

Christian love is ever-living, and it breaks out and expands in every direction. It is a love that can grow and thrive even in the worst of circumstances. Christian love is stronger than death itself, for it contains within it the mystery of Christ's Resurrection and eternal life.

Therefore, there can be no sincere and active service without the presence of this mystical love, for active service needs the power to resurrect weak and dying souls. This will never happen without the power of love.

Any servant can relay the words and teachings of Christ to others without losing a thing—he might even earn fame and accolades—but the servant who strives to relay the true essence of service (spirit and life) to others is in absolute need of the mystery of Christian love. ❖
